Our line-up contains most of the squad that finished last season, with the additions of goalkeeper Kingsley Latham, on loan for the season from Southampton, Harry Kite on loan from Exeter City for six months, Sean Stewart, who was with Blackfield & Langley last season, Callum Thompson formerly with Launceston, Cameron Murray whose previous clubs include, York City, Farsley Celtic and FC United of Manchester, and who has just relocated to the area, Josh Williams previously in Exeter City's Academy,



Also we have added Sean Stewart and Callum Thompson to the squad. I would like everyone to give all of them a warm welcome to the club.

With regards to injuries at the moment, we are missing Aaron Rodrigues, Ollie Griggs and Harry Kite. We are hoping that Harry will be available for Tuesday, after that horrendous concussion at Winchester. Aaron and Ollie will be more long term, as they recover from a

Evo-Stik League South News

The main news over the close season has been the revamping of the leagues at Step 1 to Step 6 of The Non-League Pyramid, with a key consideration being to reduce the amount of travelling that clubs have to make, thus making the leagues more "geographically friendly". However as we are members of The Southern League, I will concentrate on that league at Steps 3 and 4.

There are now two Premier Divisions of The Southern League at Step 3, each with twenty-two teams, which is a reduction of two clubs when compared with last season's Premier Division.

First of all there is now a Southern League Central Division at Step 3 which is comprised of clubs in the Midlands and the east of England. Those clubs who were members of The Southern League Premier Division last season, and who are now in this division are: Banbury United, Biggleswade Town, Hitchin Town, Kettering Town, King's Lynn Town, Redditch United, Royston Town, St. Ives Town, St. Neots Town and Stratford Town. Clubs promoted into this division are: AFC Rushden & Diamonds (ex SLE), Alvechurch (ex NPLS) and Bedworth United (ex NPLS). A number of clubs have been moved laterally into this division, namely: Barwell, (ex NPLP) Coalville Town, (ex NPLP) Halesowen Town, (ex NPLP) Leiston, (ex ILP) Lowestoft Town, (ex ILP) Needham Market, (ex ILP) Rushall Olympic (ex NPLP) and Stourbridge (ex NPLP). One club, Tamworth, has been relegated from NLN.

Next at Step 3 is the division that The Magpies will compete in, The Southern League South, and those clubs who were members of The Southern League Premier Division last season and are now in this division are: Basingstoke Town, Chesham United, Dorchester Town, Farnborough, Frome Town, Gosport Borough, Kings Langley, Merthyr Town, Tiverton Town and Weymouth. Clubs promoted into this division are: Beaconsfield Town (ex SLE), Hartley Wintney (ex SLE), Salisbury (ex SLW), Swindon Supermarine (ex SLW), Taunton Town (ex SLW), Walton Casuals (ILN) and Wimborne Town (ex SLW). Again a number of clubs have been moved laterally into this division namely: Harrow Borough, Hendon, Metropolitan Police and Staines Town (all ex ILP)

At Step 4 there are now two Southern League divisions, as there were last season, East and West, although the number of clubs has been reduced from twenty-two last season to twenty this season, and again there are a number of teams that have been promoted, relegated and moved laterally.

Those clubs who were members of last season's East Division and remain there are: AFC Dunstable, Aylesbury, Aylesbury United, Barton Rovers, Bedford Town, Cambridge City, Didcot Town, Kempston Rovers and Thame United.

Clubs promoted into this division are: Berkhampsted (ex. SSMP), Bromsgrove Sporting and Coleshill Town (ex. MLP), Welwyn Garden City (ex. SSMP) and Yaxley (ex. UCLP). Again a number of clubs have been moved laterally into this division, and they are: Corby Town (ex. NPLS), Kidlington and North Leigh (ex. SLW), and Peterborough Sports (ex. UCLP). Two clubs have been relegated into this division which are: Dunstable Town (ex. SLP) and Sutton Coldfield Town (ex. NPLP).

Those clubs who were members of last season's West Division and remain there are: AFC Totton, Barnstaple Town, Bideford, Bristol Manor Farm, Cinderford Town, Cirencester Town, Evesham United, Fleet Town, Larkhall Athletic, Mangotsfield United, Moneyfields, Paulton Rovers, Slimbridge, Winchester City and Yate Town.

Clubs promoted into this division are: Blackfield & Langley (ex. WELP), Highworth Town (ex. HLP), Melksham Town and Street (ex. WLP) and Thatcham Town (ex. HLP).

Network points for domestic and commercial situations





Very season, in conjunction with The Football Association, we produce a Pyramid Poster. It shows The National League System make-up from Steps 1 to 6 with all the Step 7 competitions also listed. When it arrives from the printers each year, it's hard not to be taken aback by the scale of it all. For a country this size, we have a tremendous number of football clubs outside of The Football League. From big cities to small towns, often boasting more than one team, to tiny villages, football weaves through the fabric of every blade of grass this country has. It's remarkable, and why everyone should be proud of the system in this country. It is feasible, although investment is needed, for a tiny village club to reach the Premier League should it win promotion and meet the offpitch standards along the way.

Our designers who put the said Pyramid Poster together are already thinking ahead a couple of years, and quite how they are going to fit it all in. As you will know, the number of divisions have expanded from this season, with an extra at both Step 3 and Step 4. It's all part of The FA's ongoing restructuring with the system in need of a reshape to fit with modern day life and an emphasis on reducing travelling times and costs. Clearly, it's never going to be perfect. The very shape of our shores mean there will always be clubs on the periphery of boundaries. Even with the new divisions, we still see some clubs particularly hard hit, often through no fault of their own, in the case of Hampshire outfit Fleet Town being shifted to a new division as a knock-on effect of Yorkshire club Shaw Lane's demise.

But there will be further changes as we move forward. The FA have confirmed they plan to introduce an eighth division at Step 4, almost certainly in the north-east, for 2020-21. There are some oddities that need to be fixed with the bottle neck that has now been created in promotions at Step 3 and 4. With only six clubs coming down from The National League North, it means only six clubs can go up from Step 3, four champions, and then super play-offs across the divisions to decide the next two. And at Step 4, only five of the seven play-off winners will go up on a points-per-game basis. It's, as the FA acknowledge, far from ideal. So expect the system to evolve over the coming years and, maybe, we could also see the much-needed third promotion place from The National League into The Football League. The English football system is unique, and fluidity of movement up and down is vital.

THE FA Cup kicks off this weekend, with more prize money on offer than ever before. It's been doubled this season, and in The Extra Preliminary Round and Preliminary Round, losing clubs will also take home a slice of the pie (£750 and £960 respectively).Fantastic news for all clubs at this level, and even more of an incentive to strive for a great run in the competition. Of course clubs can use the extra cash how they see fit but hopefully many will choose to invest it into their club, buy those new seats, put it towards that new toilet block and generally improve their facilities. No doubt, some will fancy bringing in a new striker!

A Look Back in Time – On This Date – 11th August

he Magpies have only played three games on this date, all away, since moving into our current home in 1990, two of them ended in defeat, whilst the other resulted in a comprehensive victory.

The two defeats were at Staines Town in 2009, when we lost 3-0, and the other was in 2015 when we went down 4-3 at Cirencester Town, when our goal scorers were Matt Oldring, Jonah Ayunga and Tony Lee.

The game that I have chosen to concentrate on, not surprisingly, is the 3-0 win at St. Albans City in 2007, which saw The Magpies surge to the top of The Blue Square South table, admittedly for a very limited time, after an impressive opening day performance, which saw Hardy Pinto-Moreira make his debut appearance.

The game began with little in the way of goalmouth excitement from either side in the first fifteen minutes, but the first goal scoring opportunity came the way of the home side, but Paul Bruce's free kick flew well wide from thirty yards. The Magpies then forced two corners without reward, before a superb through ball from Mark Jermyn looked to have set Charlie Henry through on goal, but he stumbled at the pivotal moment and the chance was lost.

The influential John Docker then began to make his presence felt, and he drilled in a low shot from twenty-five yards which Nick Eyre in the home goal smothered to his right, and the keeper then tipped over another effort from the same player.

The Magpies then turned their ascendancy into goals in the final fifteen minutes of the first half, but not before Eyre was needed to make a fine close range save from Henry. However there was nothing the home keeper could do in the thirty-seventh minute when Docker and Henry combined to set up Jamie Gleeson whose twenty yard shot flew into the top corner. Six minutes later a long diagonal ball from Docker found Pinto-Moreira who mesmerised the home defenders, beating three of them once and two a second time, before finally drilling a shot from twelve yards between Eyre and his near post.

City enjoyed more of the second half, but the visitors defended stoutly and Magpies' manager Shaun Brooks also changed his attacking formations a number of times during the match, with Elliot Bent replacing Pinto-Moreira to join Henry, and then substituting Henry with Matt Groves for the final ten minutes, whose first involvement saw him force a near post save from Eyre.

Then in the eighty-ninth minute The Magpies confirmed the win with the third goal, constructed by all three substitutes, after Mark Robinson, who had replaced Docker, supplied the cross which was well controlled by Bent who found Groves, and he beat Eyre with a fierce shot into the roof of the net off the underside of the cross bar from six yards.

Which was transferred up to Poundbury where The Duchy of Cornwall had agreed to take it. The remaining soil was then mixed with lime and cement to form a solid base and levelled. New drainage was dug in and the surface was covered with a membrane. The next stage was the new technology, the TigerTurf EcoCept engineered performance base layer, this porous layer is made from recycled plastic and rubber, and it was mixed on site and put down almost like a road surface. At 40mm it is thicker than traditional shock pad layers, and offers a more consistent absorbency across the entire pitch. Finally, the green carpet layer was put down and lines cut in, this was completed on the 18th August, leaving just enough time for a team of volunteers to have a clear up and build the goals before our first match on the surface against Plymouth Argyle.

The club would like to thank West Dorset District Council, Dorchester Town Council, Dorchester Town Youth FC, The Duchy of Cornwall, Dorset County Council, Tesco Bags of Help, The Postcode Lottery Community Trust and of course everyone who purchased a square in The Pitch for the Community scheme, without their support this project would have never happened.

We would also like to thank The Dorchester Round Table for their £500 donation, allowing us to purchase a stock of football boots. In order to maintain the surface, there are strict footwear rules in place, but we don't want this to be a barrier to someone playing on the pitch. These boots will be available to hire for £1.50, the hire fee will be put back into a reserve so we have funds to replace the boots when required, making this element sustainable.

We would like to think that all supporters and members of the community will get the opportunity to play on the pitch, we want to make it accessible to everyone, be that through the youth teams, soccer schools, six-a-side leagues, charity matches, Ability Counts and walking football, there are so many opportunities to play and these opportunities will only grow as we move forward.

Focus on The Met

This afternoon's game will be the first time we have played against Metropolitan Police for forty-one years, and is due to The Met moving from The Bostik (Isthmian) Premier Division to The Evo-Stik Southern League Premier Division South following the major revamp of the leagues at Steps 3 to 6 of The Non-League Pyramid, which took place during the close season.

Last season The Met finished in a solid tenth position in The Bostik Premier Division with sixty-six points from their forty-six



melvin

games, having had three points deducted for playing an ineligible player. Of the twenty-three games played at home The Met won thirteen, drew five and lost five, whilst away from home they won six, drew seven and lost ten. Overall they scored seventy-six goals and conceded seventy-one.

In last season's national cup competitions The Met eliminated Staines Town in The First Qualifying Round of The FA Cup, but were then eliminated from the competition themselves in the next round by Heybridge Swifts after an away replay, which ended in a penalty shoot-out. Magpies' fans will recall that it was Heybridge Swifts who eliminated The Magpies from last season's FA Trophy. In The FA Trophy The Met reached The Third Qualifying Round, having eliminated AFC Sudbury and Thamesmead Town in the previous rounds, before they were eliminated by Wingate & Finchley in a home tie.

By all accounts The Met have had a difficult close season, primarily due to the aforementioned move from The Isthmian League to The Southern League, despite an appeal, and which has resulted in their manager and some of their players leaving the club, with his assistant stepping up to fill the void. Thus the squad has had to be rebuilt apparently with a number of young players who are eager to do well at this level.

The Met began their pre-season friendly games on the 10th July, so, despite the difficulties mentioned above, they will undoubtedly be well prepared for the new campaign, and as with all teams from The Bostik (Isthmian) League they will prove to be difficult opponents this afternoon, so The Magpies will need to be on their mettle if they are to take anything from this game.

Players to Watch

"Luke" Williams - Goalkeeper. Talented keeper who has played at a higher level. **George Frith** - Midfield. Has played in The National League. **Max Blackmore** - Striker. A renowned goal scorer.

History of The Met

On the 6th July 1829, Sir Robert Peel formed The Metropolitan Police, the first organised police force in the world, with an office overlooking The Thames at Whitehall known as Scotland Yard, a name that has become famous throughout the world, and also became synonymous with The Metropolitan Police.

Ninety years later, in 1919, The Metropolitan Police Football Club was formed, playing friendly matches until joining The Spartan League in 1928. Apart from the war years (1939-45), the club remained in that competition until 1960. During that time The Blues were League Champions eight times, runners-up once and League Cup winners once. In 1960 The Blues joined The Metropolitan League, winning The League Cup in 1969.

In 1971 The Blues were accepted into The Southern League, and played in Division South until 1977, under Team Manager Vic Rouse, the former Wales and Crystal Palace goalkeeper.

In 1977, The Blues moved to The Isthmian League, becoming one of the founder members of the restructured Division Two. A successful first season (1977/78) resulted in the club finishing runners-up to Epsom & Ewell and being promoted to Division One. In season 1981/82 the club finished third in Division One, missing promotion by 2 points. However, fortunes changed and in 1984/5, as a result of finishing third from the bottom, The Blues were relegated to Division Two (South). Ironically, in that 1984/5 season The Blues enjoyed their best run in The F.A. Cup, reaching The First Round Proper. The home tie against Dartford was subsequently featured on the BBC's "Match of the Day" programme. Defeat against Dartford was followed by a run of defeats in the league, which saw The Blues drop into one of the four relegation places introduced that season.

On returning to Division Two (South) The Blues finished seventh in both 1985/6 and 1986/7. During 1987/88 The Blues led The Division Two (South) table in January by seven points, but they were overhauled by Chalfont St Peter, who won their last two games of the season and became champions by just one point. The Blues were runners-up by virtue of a one-goal difference over Dorking. It was a nail-biting finish to a season in which The Blues lost just two league matches, both away. The next two seasons saw the club finish in mid-table in Division One, but in 1990/1 the club finished second from bottom and were relegated into the newly formed Division Two of the restructured Diadora (Isthmian) League. The club remained in Division Two for several years, always finishing in the top half, but just outside the promotion positions. In 1993/4 The Blues again reached The First Round Proper of The F.A. Cup, losing 2:0 to Crawley Town.

Season 1994/5 saw the club celebrate its 75th Anniversary with a game against The Army, and the opening of a new grandstand at Imber Court. The Blues finished fifth in Division Two, and ended the season with a thrilling victory in The Carlsberg Trophy, defeating Collier Row in a penalty shoot-out following a 1:1 draw after extra-time. During the next few seasons the club continued to finish in the top half of Division Two, and in 1999/2000 reached The Fifth Round of The F.A. Vase, the last eight, losing to the eventual winners Deal Town. In 2002/3 The Ryman League was restructured, and The Blues were placed in Division One South. That season the club finished second from bottom, and faced the prospect of relegation. By a stroke of good fortune, only three teams were relegated from Divisions One North and South, therefore we found ourselves in a relegation play-off against Wembley, who finished second from bottom in Division One North. Fortunately, we won both legs of the play-off and retained our place in Division One South. Another poor season in 2003/4 saw us finished just above the relegation places in twentieth position. Following The F.A. restructuring of The Non-League Pyramid, in 2004/5 we found ourselves in The Ryman League Division One. In their first full season in charge, the new manage ment team of Jim Cooper, assisted by Gavin MacPherson and John Nicholson, had an immediate impact and we finished fifth in Division One, thus qualifying for the play-offs, introduced as part of The F.A. restructuring, where we played Bromley. An evenly balanced encounter ended with the scores 1-1 after extra time, but we lost 4:3 on penalties. In 2005/6 we finished in fourth position in The Ryman Division One, but again fell at the playoff semi-final stage, losing 1-0 to Dover Ath. Further F.A. restructuring resulted in a Ryman League Division 1 North and Division 1 South in 2006/7, and the club finished in sixth position in Division 1 South. With only one club promoted automatically, the club narrowly missed out on a play-off place However, the club reached the final of The Surrey Senior Cup for the first time since 1933, but were beaten 4-1 after extra time by Tooting & Mitcham United, the score after ninety minutes was 1-1. In 2007/8 The Blues finished fourth in Ryman League Division 1 South, but for the third time in four years was beaten in the play-off semi final, this time 2-0 by Cray Wanderers. In 2008/9 the club again finished in fourth position in Ryman Division One South, thus qualifying for the play offs for the fourth time in five seasons, winning the semi final play off match 1-0 against Fleet Town, but losing 1-0 to Cray Wanderers in the final In 2009/10 MPFC had a disappointing Ryman Division 1 South league campaign. After a poor start the club was never in a position to mount a serious challenge for a play off position, and finished in tenth position. However, this disappointment was off-set by winning The London Senior Cup for the first time in the club's history, beating AFC Wimbledon in an exciting final, 4-3 on penalties, after the match ended 4-4 after extra time.

The 2010/11 season proved to be the most exciting in the club's history, culminating in the club winning The Ryman League Division 1 South Championship by the narrow margin of one goal. Bognor Regis Town had a two point advantage during the latter stages of the season, and that was the situation when the clubs lined up for the final match. Bognor were held to an unexpected draw by Chatham Town, and with The Met managing to scramble a 1-0 win against Merstham, it was enough to win the title with a goal difference of sixty-one against Bognor's sixty. So, for the first time in the club's history it competed in The Ryman League Premier Division during the 2011/12 season. The club got off to a flying start, and at Christmas found themselves in fourth position, but unfortunately fell away in the second half of the season and finished in twelfth position. The 2012/13 season proved to be the most successful in the club's history at that stage, finishing in sixth position in The Ryman League Premier Division, missing out on a play-off place on goal difference of nine goals. The club had a good run in The F.A. Cup, reaching The First Round Proper, eventually losing 2-1 to Crawley Town from League One of The Football League.

The 2013/14 season was less successful in respect of The Ryman League Premier Division, in that we spent much of the season in mid-table, eventually finishing in seventeenth position. Although we were knocked out of The FA Cup and FA Trophy at an early stage, we reached the final of The London Senior Cup and Surrey Senior Cup. The 2014/15 season ended with us reaching The Ryman League Premier Division play-offs, albeit, via an unusual set of circumstances. We actually finished in sixth position in The Premier Division, but after a protracted series of appeals, Enfield Town were deducted three points, and we ended up in fifth position Unfortunately, we lost the play-off semi-final 2-1 to Hendon. However, we enjoyed success in The Surrey Senior Cup, beating Merstham 2-0 in the final

In 2015/16 we finished in twelfth position. We had mixed fortunes in the cup competitions, falling at the first hurdle in The FA Cup, after a replay with Sittingbourne, and The First Round of The London Senior Cup to London Bari on penalties. We faired marginally better by reaching The Second Round of The Ryman League Cup and The Third Round of The Surrey Senior Cup before losing to Tooting & Mitcham and Molesey respectively. We had a decent run in The FA Trophy losing eventually in The Third Qualifying Round to a good Wealdstone side, after beating AFC Hornchurch and Canvey Island in previous rounds. The 2016/17 season was one of mixed emotions and ups and downs. The first eleven struggled with form and consistency, which resulted in a relegation battle that went to the last game of the season. The high point was reaching the final of The London Senior Cup, with some memorable and exciting matches, but unfortunately we lost in the final. The 2017/18 season was again one of mixed emotions, with the first eleven in the hunt for play off places for the majority of the season, before falling away and finishing tenth. We reached the final of The Bostik League Cup where we lost 5-3 to Billericay Town. Due to FA restructuring we have been moved from The Bostik league to The Southern League, which has led to the departure of our long serving manager Jim Cooper, a number of players and also greatly increased travelling costs.

Meet The Met

Management GAVIN MACPHERSON.

Appointed as manager at the start of this season following the resignation of Jim Cooper. Gavin has been with the club for a number of years as a player, reserve team manager and Jim's assistant for over twelve years, Regarded by his peers and many players as a fantastic, innovative coach. Previously as a player, was a professional footballer at Barnet and Carlisle United before playing non- league for Wealdstone, Windsor & Eton and Metropolitan Police.

JON NURSE. Former professional footballer with Dagenham and latterly Barnet FC. Jon scored the winning goal in the 2010 Division Two Play-Off Final at Wembley, but has also won The F.A. Trophy with Stevenage in 2006-7. Jon helped coach Barnet to be Conference champions under the management of Martin Allen. Jon has six caps for Barbados, and has now been promoted to Assistant Manager at the start of this season.

STEVE BOGIDI. Became the club's Physiotherapist in March 2017. He previously played for The Met, spanning an eight year period, before turning his hand to Physiotherapy. Steve previously played for Dulwich Hamlet and Croydon Athletic.

SCOTT TARR. Ex England C international goalkeeper. Became the club's goalkeeping coach midway through the 2014-15 season. He was an excellent shot stopper himself, and was regarded at the time as one of the best in non-league circles. He played the majority of his football career with Basingstoke Town, but also with Yeading and Farnborough Town.

Thomas "LUKE "WILLIAMS. A talented goalkeeper who joined from Harrow Borough in July 2017. Luke is the brother of defender Sam Williams. Luke has previously played for Aldershot, Hereford and Slough Town. Sam WILLIAMS. Defender, aged 20, who joined The Met in 2016, having previously played for Cardiff City and Motherwell. Sam is a tough tackling defender, who can play anywhere across the back four. He is a former Wales Youth International, and had a short spell at Hungerford Town before returning to Imber Court in January 2017.

Oliver KNIGHT, Aged 21. Oliver is an attacking midfielder, who joined the club at the start of this season from Frome Town. His previous clubs are Forest Green Rovers and Cirencester Town.

Alex FISHER. Alex is aged 21, and an attacking left back. He was an academy player at Q.P.R. before joining the club this season from Ashford Town (Middlesex).

Luke MITCHELL. A versatile player aged 19. Began at Guildford City FC before joining The Met's youth team, and was part of the team that completed a treble that season. Was part of the reserve team that won the league last season, and has now progressed to the first team squad.

Jack MAZZONE. Jack is 25 years old and joined the club this season from South Park .He is a goal scoring forward whose previous clubs include Woking, Hendon, Godalming and Tooting and Mitcham. Nesta GUINNESS-WALKER. Aged 18. Another product of our successful reserve and youth teams, who is entering his first season in the squad having made his debut last season. A quick and versatile defender.

Louis BIRCH. Aged 20. A tough tackling midfielder, who was part of the club's very successful reserve team last season, and is now part of the squad for the new season.

Head to Head

Dorchester Town v Metropolitan Police

Some Magpies' fans may be surprised to learn that The Magpies and The Met have met on ten previous occasions, all of them in the 1970's, and all of them Southern League fixtures, and today's encounter will be the first played between the two clubs for over forty years.

The first meeting took place on the 16th December 1972, when

we visited Imber Court in East Molesey, Surrey, and we came away with a point after a 1-1 draw, thanks to a goal scored by Brian Gosby. The return fixture was a day that The Magpies would not wish to revisit by choice, with The Met dishing out a 6-1 thrashing on the old Avenue Ground, with Colin Guy our solitary goal scorer. I would imagine that our President, Keith Kellaway, may well have played in those fixtures, so I will be interested to hear of any memories he may have of those games!

In overall terms our record against The Met is a reasonable one, with four wins overall, three at home, three draws, one at home, and three defeats, again one at home, referred to above. Full details of those games, together with the other eight matches are detailed below:

DORCHESTER TOWN FC GROUND REGULATIONS



Notice: Entry to the Ground is expressly subject to acceptance by the visitor of these Ground Regulations and the rules and regulations of The Football Association and The Southern Football League in respect of the relevant competition and the laws of the game.

Entry to the Ground shall constitute acceptance of the Ground Regulations.

1. The Club management reserve the right of admission to the Ground. On no account will admission be granted to a person who is subject to a current Exclusion Order.

2. Play cannot be guaranteed to take place on any particular day or at any particular time and the Club management reserve the right to change its advertised fixture without notice or liability.

3. In the event of a match being postponed or abandoned, any refund of the admission charge will be at the sole discretion of the Club management. This is subject to a time limitation, the details of which are obtainable from the Club.

4. No alcohol to be brought into the ground.

5. The Club management reserves the right to refuse admission to the Ground, or eject from the Ground, any person who refuses to be searched by any servant or agent of the Club or any Police Officer.

6. Fireworks, flares, smoke canisters, knives, bottles, cans, poles and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety are not permitted within the Ground.

7. The following offences are strictly forbidden. The club reserves the right to prosecute or eject any person who within the club premises is deemed to behave in any of the following ways:

- The throwing of any object onto the field of play.
- Unauthorised entry onto the Field of Play, except in an emergency.
- Being under the influence of alcohol or drugs; making vulgar gestures; using any form of verbal abuse or any form of discrimination; using obscene language; taunting opposing team supporters; or entering reserved areas for opposing supporters. The club may at its discretion bar anyone guilty of such an offence for a period of up to five years.

8. The obstruction of gangways, access ways, exits and entrances, stairways and like places at all times and the standing in seated areas whilst play is in progress is strictly forbidden. Any person who persistently contravenes this Regulation will be ejected from the Ground.

9. The climbing of floodlight pylons stands or any other structure within the ground is strictly forbidden.

10. Unnecessary noise such as that from the use of radio sets and behaviour likely to cause confusion or annoyance to any person is not permitted in any part of the Ground.

11. Only persons specifically authorised in writing by the Club management are permitted to offer for sale or distribute within the Ground any newspaper, periodical or other article.

12. Any person found damaging or defacing the property of the Club will be prosecuted.

13. Persons failing to comply with instructions from a Police Officer Steward or other authorised agent of the Club will be ejected from the Ground.

14. The Club Management reserves the right for its servants, agents and police to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with all these rules and regulations, or whose presence within the ground is, or could be reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to any other person.
