

MANAGER'S NOTEBOOK

Good afternoon and welcome to everyone from Aylesbury FC.

Wow, what another difficult week it has been. The frustrating thing is we know that we are such a threat going forward and have clear working tactics and personnel that are able to execute the plans well. In 7 games we have scored 15 goals and in league terms that gets you somewhere near the top of the table. So believe me, we are acutely aware of the problem. Defensively we have studied the tapes forensically and we know the problem. We are also recruiting in that area to create more competition and we have a formal approach in place for a very experienced player that will organise and communicate. This will add some pressure for places which is always a healthy thing. Having said that, it's obvious to see to all that yet again we have a goalkeeper problem. In truth we pretty much have had this from the off. In the last game I was in shock, like a bad dream. Surely this couldn't be happening yet again.

In late pre-season someone said to me, "my word, who would have believed it after last year using 9 keepers, playing outfield players in goal from the off and having to go in during games", who would believe that here we are with 3 fit healthy excellent goalkeepers. I said to him "hey, don't say that!, please don't tempt fate." Well, 7 games in here we are again. No Goalkeepers fit. In truth, we have been

carrying this burden in most of the games. We had the FA Cup ripped away from us. Will should never have been sent off. That decision doesn't just end with the loss of income and disappointment but we then suffer further punishment forcing poor Nathan back in earlier than we would have liked and this then has a constant knock on affect that has ended with them both now injured.

Poor Will then has been carrying an ongoing ankle problem which he is compensating for in kicking and then pulls his groin within 4 minutes of the start at Chesham leaving him unable to run, sweep, kick and restricted lateral movement. He desperately tried to ride the pain but we had to take the decision out of his hands as we will always put players welfare first.

As you read this we hope you can see on the pitch a new keeper warming up. I have known this lad since a very young age. He also has had a taster at this level so I'm sure he will step in now and fight for a regular place rather than just plug a gap. Onwards and upwards, tough week but we are resilient, we dust ourselves down and believe me, we will be full of fight now to keep an unbeaten run in the league going.

AYLESBURY HISTORY


The club has enjoyed a long history in senior and junior football dating back to the 1930's under the previous names of Aylesbury Vale, Haywood United, Belgrave, Stocklake and Negretti and Zambra FC, which was founded in the 1930's by workers at the Negretti and Zambra company then based in London's King Cross district. The company moved to the Stocklake Industrial Estate, Aylesbury.

After gaining senior status and promotion to the Chiltern League in 1988, Stocklake enjoyed many further successes including Division One runners up in 1991, Premier Division and League Cup runners up the following season and Wycombe Senior Cup success in 1995. Cup success was also followed on in the following season, this time the Berks and Bucks Intermediate Cup being added to the trophy cabinet. Belgrave FC was formed in 1983 by Jim Sullivan who lived in nearby Belgrave Road, Jim had two sons who were passionate about football but were limited to where they could play, so formed a team himself with the help of neighbours Lynne and David Hatcher. By 1990, under the guidance of Danny Martone, Belgrave had grown to five youth teams providing football for over ninety boys from the Quarrendon and Haydon Hill areas of Aylesbury.

1996 saw the forming of two senior teams under the Belgrave FC name and by the turn of the millennium teams were represented at all levels from Under 8's through to seniors, some 200 players being registered, this also including Stocklake Ladies. In 2000 four youth teams won league and cup honours, whilst the senior team went on to win the Aylesbury District Cup, the Field Shield and ADL Premier

Division runners up.

At the start of the 2000/2001 season, the senior Belgrave FC team was



renamed Haywood United following an amalgamation with Stocklake FC with Danny Martone voted in as chairman of the new club. Haywood United joined the Spartan South Midlands League and won promotion into Division One after two seasons. Notable achievements during the 2001/2002 season included league awards for the best kept and most improved ground; this included the erection of floodlights and perimeter fencing, which Danny and his hard working committee fought hard to establish. Another award was gained for the match day programme in recognition of how much the club was developing. Season 2002/2003 saw a difficult start in Division One, but with the arrival of manager Jon Franklin and his assistant Keith Walker just after Christmas, the club eventually consolidated finishing in 9th place. Promotion was gained to the South Midlands Premier Division the following year after a campaign that saw 23 wins, 7 draws and only 4 losses. Haywood United proved themselves capable of staying in the Premier Division after finishing 3rd in the 2004/2005 season in a campaign that only include one loss in the twenty matches after Christmas. The club also entered the FA Cup and Vase for the first time and won the Buckingham Charity Cup in 2006.


Season 2006/2007 began with Haywood United becoming Aylesbury Vale FC and saw Keith Walker and Steve Gleinster take over as joint managers and steadily build a

squad. This was recognised in the 2008/2009 season with a good cup run in the FA Cup and FA Vase, winning three rounds in the FA Cup losing to Level 4 side Gosport after a replay, and losing out in the 4th round of the FA Vase to Leiston Town.

After Christmas the side suffered due to long term injuries and finished mid table. May 2009 saw a major new development in a new semi professional side. Aylesbury Football Club was formed under the leadership of Chairman Roger Dance and assisted by Vice Chairman Danny Martone. Former Chairman Bill Harrison was made President of the club. Great success on the field of play was to follow, with the team having a fantastic run in the F.A. Cup. We were the last 'level five' team in the country to remain in the competition and were rewarded with a visit to Haywood Way for the F.A. Cup trophy, allowing the team, supporters and local people to get their hands on this famous trophy and make the most of this memorable occasion. We were finally knocked out of the competition by Wealdstone in a close game. A brave and superb display was witnessed by a bumper crowd of 800 plus.Meanwhile, away from the midst of F.A. Cup drama, our success continued, becoming 'Double Winners' Winning both the Spartan South Midland League and League Cup capping an extraordinary season and gaining promotion to the Southern League Division 1 Central.

Steve Bateman took over in 2013/14, steered the club to safety in his first 6 months in charge. Then in 2014/15 with Bateman at the helm FC has their most successful season to date most successful to date. Playing at the highest level in the club's history. the team finished third in the League, having pushing been

the 2015/16 finished with a flourish as the club finished just outside the play off positions, but had the consolation of our first major Cup Final, beating Chesham United in the Berks & Bucks Cup at Windsor. Steve Bateman and his management team resigned at the end of the season and Danny Gordon & Gareth Risbridger took the helm, supported by Paul Bonham . Rvan Wiffin & Aaron Norman. Davis Haule took over from Gordon & Risbridger in December 2016, appointed brother Brian as his assistant and recruited former coaches Fraser McLachlan, Aaron Wiffin and added Ryan Collings to his back room staff for the 2017/18 season.

2017/18 was a difficult season for club finishing 21st and avoiding relegation due to the League re organisation. This season sees a new era with ex Leighton manager Scott Reynolds taking over the reigns assisted by Matt Moran. Lea Coulter and the returning Paul Bonham

Aylesbury Football Club prides itself on clear ambitions: to progress to higher league football and to achieve higher league status with squads from local talent. The club hopes to continue to work with other local community groups and enhance the clubs facilities to benefit the people within Aylesbury.

REPORTING IN DUNSTABLE TOWN 0-4 CORBY TOWN

The cruelty of football was in evidence at Creasey Park on Tuesday night as Corby Town rolled up their sleeves and displayed some more of the steel we had seen at Steel Park on Saturday August 25th when, three goals behind at half time, they had clawed their way back into this thrilling FA Cup Preliminary Round tie to force a replay at Creasey Park.

The margins between success and failure can be cigarette paper thin and thus on the 25th August a goalscoring opportunity thwarted by heroic last ditch goalkeeping saw Dunstable go from what would have been a three goal cushion to a solitary goal lead as Corby stormed up the other end and pinched a second goal. The rest, as they say, is history, and not history I intend to dwell on.


On Tuesday night Corby were out of the traps at pace and played the first few minutes forcing Dunstable on to the back foot. Will Hunt was called into action early doors but with John Sonuga back in action after Saturday's enforced absence, leading the back line, the defence held firm.

Dunstable fans had already raised their arms in celebration when a deft header from Chris Wreh glanced agonisingly wide after 20 minutes and only a minute later, Saul Williams broke free and advanced on goal at pace. Such is Saul's current goalscoring prowess I'd begun to wonder whether I could get away with another Better Call Saul headline, however before he could get his shot away, he was tackled and Corby survived.

With Corby attacking the car park end, and cheered on by a fair size traveling support, the deadlock was broken on 33 minutes by Joel Carta, who finished a clever move from just

inside the box, giving Will no chance.

Back came Dunstable in numbers and in strength. A fierce shot from



With Dunstable still looking dangerous and the game nearing half time, Corby got a vital psychological boost as they grabbed a second in added time at the end of the first half.

Worst was to follow as within two minutes of the start of the second half, Ben Bradshaw put Corby three up, only to claim a second eight minutes later.

Dunstable had a mountain to climb. On came Nathan Mullings and Daniel Trif and credit to all the boys in blue for putting in a shift. The game may have been to all intent and purpose but you'd never have thought it by the energy and running on show.

The Match officials after the match paid tribute to the indefatigable Dunstable spirit and competitive nature however I suspect that was scant consolation to Tony, Gareth and the players who had been a hare's breath away from what would have been a thoroughly well-earned victory back on August 25th.

ON THIS DAY ... by Brian Seal



15 SEPTEMBER 1941 - SCORING IN THE SIXTIES

On 15 September 1941, Hungarian striker and 1967 European Footballer of the Year Flórián Albert was born in the village of Hercegszántó. He has been described as one of the most elegant players of all time.


Albert spent his entire career with one club, Ferencváros. From 1958 to 1974, he made 351 league appearances and scored 255 goals, for a career average of just over 0.72 goals per match. Both Albert and his club had prolific success in the 1960s. In the 1959-60 and 1960-61 seasons, he was the Hungarian league's top scorer, with 27 and 21 goals respectively, and later repeated the feat in 1964-65. Ferencváros, meanwhile, won four league titles (1963, 1964, 1967, and 1968), as well as the 1965 Fairs Cup (the predecessor to the UEFA Cup). He was also the top scorer

in the 1966-67 Fairs Cup with 8 goals, despite being eliminated in the third round by Eintracht Frankfurt, a feat which was instrumental in his winning the Ballon d'Or.

He retired in 1974 after making only 9 appearances and scoring 2 goals in the '73-'74 season. In 2007, Ferencváros named their stadium in his honor.

ON THE ROAD WITH THE BLUES

The club was established in 1909. They initially played in village leagues and won the Lord Jersey Cup in 1929, beating Fritwell 2–1 in the final. In 1945 the club joined the Oxford City Junior League, before progressing to the Oxfordshire Senior League in 1951. They were champions of the league in 1952–53 and moved up to the Hellenic League in 1954. When the league gained a second division in 1956, the club were placed in the Premier Division.

In 1961–62 Kidlington finishing second-frombottom of the Premier Division and were relegated to Division One. They were Division One runnersup in 1963–64, earning promotion back to the Premier Division

However, they were relegated again two seasons later. League reorganisation saw them placed in Division One B in 1971–72, before it reverted to a single division the following season. The club won the Division One Cup in 1974–75, and after finishing as Division One runners-up in 1978–79, they were promoted back to the Premier Division. However,

the club finished bottom of the Premier Division in 1981–82, resulting in relegation to Division One.



In 2000 Division One was split into regional sections, with Kidlington placed in Division One West. A third-place finish in 2004–05 saw them promoted to the Premier Division. They won the league's Floodlit Cup in 2007–08 and the Supplmentary Cup in 2010–11.

After finishing the 2015–16 season as Premier Division champions, the club were promoted to Division One Central of the Southern League and finished a creditable 12th. At the end of the following season they were transferred to Division One West

The club were transferred again to Division One Central of the Southern League at the end of the 2017–18 season as part of the restructuring of the non-League pyramid.





Bromsgrove Sporting club was founded in 2009 as a supporters consortium with the plan to buy Bromsgrove Rovers and take them out of administration. When another owner was found for Rovers it was decided to create a new club instead. On 2 June 2010 Sporting were offered the lease of Victoria Ground after they had promised to make the ground available for Bromsgrove Rovers fixtures too. However in August 2010, Bromsgrove Rovers were expelled from the Southern League, thus allowing Sporting sole use of the Victoria Ground. The Rovers club was subsequently dissolved.

For season 2012–13 Bromsgrove Sporting were promoted to the Midland Football Combination Premier Division due to a reorganisation of that league. On 10 May 2014, in front of a crowd of 414 at the Victoria Ground, Bromsgrove, Sporting's first team lifted their first piece of silverware, recording a 4–1 victory over Paget Rangers in the final of the Smedley Crooke Memorial Charity Cup with goals by Danny Ludlow (2) & Billy Russell (2).

As of season 2014-15 the league was rebranded Midland Football League after the Midland Football Combination merged with the Midland Alliance. Sporting played that season in the First Division of the MFL.

Bromsgrove gained a reputation for being the perennial bridesmaids, finishing 2nd for three consecutive years prior to 2016-17 in a league that offers just the one promotion place. However the 16-17 season saw the club finish as champions and thus gaining promotion to the MFL Premier Division at last, becoming 'invincibles' in the process as the side remained unbeaten in the league. Sporting also reached the semi finals of the F.A. Vase, before being edged out 2-1 on aggregate by Cleethorpes Town one game from Wembley. Season 17-18 saw Sporting become champions of the MFL Premier Division at their first attempt, thus achieving back to back promotions and securing a place in the Southern League Division One Central for season 2018-19. The club also won The Worcestershire FA Senior Urn for the second successive season.
