HEINZ STUY. Goalkeeper. This has been a most propitious season for young Stuy. Though he had been with Ajax for several years, it was only this season that he was given a regular first team place, after Gert Bals, the veteran goalkeeper, was transferred.

HEINZ STUY

VELIVOR VASOVIC (Captain). Sweeper or stopper. This 31-year-old centre-half is playing his third European Cup Final, the first being for Partizan of Belgrade in 1966, the second for Ajax, whom he joined in 1967, against Milan. He has played at Wembley before, too; with the Yugoslav international team. Yugoslav player of the year for 1966, he went to Ajax in 1967, but intends to return to Belgrade at the end of this season. A fine all-round player who often scores goals, besides preventing them.

WIM SUURBIER. Right-back. Versatile footballer, a Dutch international who recently scored against Luxembourg. Played in the last Ajax European Cup Final against Milan in 1969, and against Arsenal in the Fairs Cup semi-finals, last season.



BARRY HULSHOFF. Stopper. A powerfully built player, strong in the tackle, and also noted for the power of his free kicks. One of them brought a goal against Celtic in the quarter-finals. Played in the 1969 European Cup Final.

NICO RIJNDERS. Can play either in the back four or in midfield. Ajax signed him from the quaintly named Go Ahead Devanter club at the start of last season. He is another of their many Dutch internationals.

JOHAN NEESKENS. Midfield. One of the most exciting new European stars of this season, Neeskens emerged with Ajax last year, as a 19-year-old, and got his first cap soon afterwards against Rumania, a game which Holland won 2-0. He is now a regular member of the Dutch national side. His long hair and elegant skills recall those of his namesake, the great Cruyff.

JACQUES SWART. Outside-right. A veteran international right winger who played against Milan in the 1969 European Final, Swart is quick, clever and experienced.

GERRIT MUHREN. Midfield. A Dutch international who joined Ajax in 1968, from Volendam. Had a couple of games against England last season, each time as substitute. Works admirably with Rijnders and Neeskens in midfield.



PLAYERS

JOHAN CRUYFF. Centre-forward. One of the world's most gifted and dazzling forwards. Tall, slender but tough, with marvellous control and acceleration, a splendid eye for creating as well as taking an opening. Born in Amsterdam, on April 25, 1947, he joined Ajax as a boy and despite a spirited attempt by Barcelona to sign him a year ago, he remains in Holland. His career in the international side, which began at 18, has been a somewhat stormy one, including a year's suspension after he was provoked in a game against Czechoslovakia, while injury has kept him out of the Dutch side this season. Ajax's main hope of victory today.



VELIVOR VASOVIC



DICK VAN DIJK. Striker. Joint top scorer of the Dutch League in season 1968/9 when playing for F.C. Twente, scoring 30 goals. Ajax signed him the following close season. A Dutch international.

PIET KEIZER. Outside-left. Like Cruyff, his close friend, this gifted winger has had his ups and downs in the national side, from which he disappeared between November 1967 and 1970. He fought back bravely from a severe head injury suffered in October, 1963, when only 18, in a derby match against DWS, necessitating an operation. He and Cruyff work cleverly together.



HORST BLANKENBURG. Signed from Munich 1860 and started with Ajax on a two year contract in December 1970. Replaces Rudd Krol at full back who suffered a broken leg.

ARIE HAAN. Played last year in the second team, Ajax bought him from WVV (Winschoten) a small city in the north of the Netherlands. A student, 22 years old.

SIES WEVER. Substitute goalkeeper, joined Ajax from Sportclub Assen. Was also a member of the Dutch amateur side.



HISTORY OF EUROPEAN CUP SOCCER

THIS is the third time that Wembley has been favoured with the honour of staging the European Cup Final; the annual climax of the most absorbing international competition for clubs in the world. The last occasion that the final was held here was in May 1968 when Manchester United created history by becoming the first English club to win the trophy when they beat Benfica 4-1 after extra time.

Three years earlier the Portuguese side had lost 2-1 to AC Milan in Wembley's initial presentation in the series. Then the European Champions Club Cup had been in existence for seven years but in thought for several more decades as the idea of such a competition had first been conceived in the 1920s.

The forerunner of the European Cup in those days was the Mitropa Cup of Central Europe but the Second World War ended any further development. It was not until a re-organised Mitropa, a Latin Cup and the clash of leading teams in friendly matches sparked fragmentary notions which were eventually fused into the reality of a comprehensive European Cup in 1955.

Gabriel Hanot, the Football Editor of L'Equipe was the man who finally precipitated events. He received encouraging support from leading clubs on the Continent and with UEFA assuming the responsibility for organising the competition the rest—as they say in the best books—is history. Its pages reveal a mixture of drama, excitement, triumph and tragedy, providing entertainment watched annually by 2,000,000 spectators and countless other millions on television.

Sixteen teams actually entered the initial competition and though



they were not all champions of their respective countries in that inaugural season, they represented more than the pioneering promise of practicality.

Real Madrid became the first winners and went on to establish the kind of fact that reads like fiction a decade later. But they were real in more than one sense. Their achievement of winning the first five competitions will probably never be equalled, certainly not beaten. Could anyone say they were not the greatest club side of all time? In 1960 they crowned their triumphs by beating Eintracht Frankfurt 7-3 at Hampden Park in a feast of attacking football which today seems just a sad echo of long ago.

True Real Madrid had outstanding individual performers like Alfredo Di Stefano but they were always a team, too, who moved with precision without ever looking anything but artists of imagination and flair, improvising cleverly as situations developed.

Benfica from Portugal took over as champions from Iberia for two years before the Italians carried the Latin flag over three seasons with their two leading Milan clubs. A new look Real, inevitably suffering from their illustrious predecessors, won again in 1966 before the first non-Latin breakthrough came in 1967.

Celtic actually carried the fight into Latin land, beating Inter-Milan in an electrifying match in Lisbon, which showed that skill, determination and applied pressure could outwit the best of defences.

Then came Manchester United's turn on that memorable night in May 1968 when they swept to victory in extra time; goals from Bobby Charlton (two), George Best and Brian Kidd on his 19th birthday, clinching the tie. It was fitting that they should have won if only for the memories of that pre-Munich side which had been cruelly crushed in the wreckage of a plane crash just when they were maturing into a team capable of challenging even Real Madrid.

This English success continued the new trend which produced more fresh faces for the final. For three successive years a Dutch team has reached the ultimate round. Feijenoord were winners last year, Ajax are hoping to emulate their feat tonight. The first Greek team to get to the final of one of the major European tournaments is lined up against them. And the Panathinaikos manager is Ferenc Puskas himself, the "Galloping Major" of the 1950s.

And next season even Di Stefano will be back in the competition as boss of Valencia, the 1971 Spanish champions. New names, agreed, but old friends to remind us of the tradition of a competition which affords the elite of Europe a stimulus outside the horizons of domesticity.

GREAT DAY, PUSKAS

DUTCH 'TREBLE'

Na November Wednesday afternoon, nearly eighteen years ago, Ferenc Puskas, the "Galloping Major," led out a Hungarian international team which was to thrash England 6-3 and take away their unbeaten home record against foreign teams. Today, rather stouter, rather less ebullient, Puskas returns, to lead out a very different team; Panathinaikos, astonishing Greek conquerors of both Everton and Red Star, Belgrade.

It was Puskas and his Hungarians who virtually began a new era in British football, posed a hundred questions with their immaculate destruction of what, with hindsight, is evident now as a good England team. Puskas' wonderful technique, his formidable left footed shot, went on to make him a reputation in this very European Cup quite the equal of the one he established with Hungary. At Real Madrid, side by side with Alfredo Di Stefano, he scored four splendid goals at Hampden in the European Final of 1960, another three at Amsterdam, in the Final of 1962, when it was no fault of his that Real lost to Benfica.

Puskas was beyond doubt a very great player, and it is intriguing that he should now emerge as a successful manager, in an era of football for which he has never had much love. Meeting him in widely scattered places-in Viña del Mar, during the 1962 World Cup, a London hotel, before he played one of his last games for Real, at Chelsea, a train en route to Liverpool, with his Panathinaikos players-one has always sensed a great nostalgia for the past, when you gladly gave away three goals, knowing you could score six. Football, as Puskas will inform you sadly, has changed, and his own approach has had to change with it. But he has worked wonders in Athens, wonders of morale as much as anything else. How many teams, after all, could hope to come back as Panathinaikos did, in the semi-finals, from a deficit of three goals?

Puskas and Panathinaikos wish, no doubt, that they could bring with them the claustrophobic fervour, the grassless pitch, of their own stadium. But whatever happens today, their achievement in reaching Wembley is an astonishing one, underlining the theme of one's recent article in this programme, that there are no more "pushovers."

T is fascinating and instructive to see the development of European club football, through the history of the European Cup. This, for example, is the third Final to take place at Wembley, and the first to be without a Latin club. Benfica took part in two of them, Milan beating them in the first.

Dutch football, significantly enough, is represented for the third Final in succession. Ajax reached the 1969 Final, where they were comfortably beaten, in Madrid, by Milan, but last season their rivals from Rotterdam, Feijenoord, actually won the tournament, by defeating Celtic, at San Siro, Milan.

Founded in 1955, the European Cup's first four Finals were contested by Latin teams, and all won by Real Madrid, who added a fifth title in 1960 when they beat the first non-Latin side to reach the Final, Eintracht.

The Latin domination then reasserted itself; the Finals of 1961, 1962, 1963, 1964 and 1965 were all wholly Latin affairs. 1966 at last saw another non-Latin team in the Final, but Partizan of Belgrade were defeated in Brussels by Real Madrid, and it was not until 1967 that at last a non-Latin team won the Cup. That, of course, was Celtic, but they, like Manchester United, the following year, beat a Latin team in the Final. Next came Milan's victory over Ajax, and it was only last year that the Final did not include a Latin team, for the first time. This is the second.

Panathinaikos are certainly the most remote and unexpected outsiders ever to get to the Final, a sign that not only is the pendulum of the competition swinging away from Latin football, but towards a greater democracy. The rise of Dutch football has taken place on so large and impressive a scale that it is all too easy to take it for granted, yet before Ajax reached their first Final in 1969, the furthest a Dutch club had ever progressed in the tournament was to the semi-finals; once. Feijenoord did it, in 1963.

If Holland can send three clubs into the Final in successive years, and Greece can send Panathinaikos there, hope clearly exists for any country of even moderate size and resources. If clubs like Ajax have become prosperous, it is because they have organised themselves so efficiently and played so wonderfully well in recent years. Certainly they have never been able to compete at the same economic level as the richest Latin clubs.

Whoever wins today's Final, it will always be remembered as an historic one, one in which the new aristocracy came up against the new giantkillers. Giantkilling, the very essence of a Cup, was the very thing the European Cup once lacked, but lacks no longer.

MIMIS DOMAZOS (Captain). Midfield. The outstanding Greek player of all time. Has gained 33 international caps and has captained the national side on 12 occasions. A great midfield player called the "General" by his team-mates and opponents. Loved and respected by everyone in Greece. Married to the number one singer of Greece, Vicky Mosholiou, and the father of two daughters. A great captain and always ready to set the example to his team-mates on and off the field. Has gained every honour the game has to offer and has to show for 12 years in football, seven championship medals, two cup medals. At the age of 28, achieved his life-long ambition to play in a European Championship Final.

TAKIS ECONOMOPOULOS Goalkeeper. First joined the Club nine years ago and has been the regular goalkeeper ever since. An international player of great experience and one of the stars of the team. Capped 18 times. 28 years of age. Married.





GIANIS TOMARAS. Right-back. A product of the youth team gained international honours for the first time this season. A tough full-back with a very bright future. 22 years of age. Married. Builder by profession. Two international appearances.

GEORGE VLAHOS. Left-back. The discovery of the season started last year as a midfield player and was converted into a modern left full-back. An under-23 international and a player of great potential has made a great impression in all the European Cup games in which he has played. Age 23. Single. A student of Economics.





COSTAS ELEFTERAKIS. *Midfield*. Joined the club two years ago and at the age of twenty, one of the great midfield players of Greek football. Six times international. 20 years of age. Married.

ARISTIDIS KAMARAS. Forward. The veteran of the team, 32 years of age, has played nine consecutive years for the Club. A fully qualified lawyer with a flourishing practice in Athens. Has won every honour the game has to offer, six championship medals, two cup winners medals and 28 international caps. Has captained his club and the national team on several occasions. A great sportsman admired by all Greek football fans. Married and the father of a two-year-old son.



PLAYERS

ANTONIS ANTONIADIS. Centre-forward. This season's leading scorer of the European Cup competition with ten goals. His club manager, the great Ferenc Puskas, scored 12 in the 1959-60 competition. A strong 6ft. 3in. centre-forward with an accurate and hard shot with either foot and great heading ability. Three times international. 24 years of age. Single. Insurance broker.







FRAGISKOS SOURPIS. Defender. A fully qualified doctor aged 28, single and has six international caps. A product of the youth team and a great club man and a defender of great experience.

HARIS GRAMMOS. Right Winger. An orthodox right winger of the old school who has made his presence felt in all the big games this season and has left opposing full-backs standing. Single. 22 years of age. Physical trainer.



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PANAGIOTIS FILAKOURIS. Forward. An under-23 international. A player with great heart and never stops running for ninety minutes. Has played five years with the Club and has filled every midfield and attacking position. Aged 23. Single.

ANTHIMOS KAPSIS. Centre-half. Another great discovery who played his first game at Goodison Park against Everton and has never looked back since. Has made a great name for himself in the last two months. A 6ft. 2in. centre-half with a great temperament for the great occasion. Aged 22. Single. Travel Agent.



VASILI CONSTANDINOU. A great clubman and an exceptional goalkeeper gained under-23 international honours when playing for the reserves. Has been playing second fiddle to Economopoulos for five years. Aged 24. Married.

VICTOR MITROPOULOS. Right-back. Aged 25. Has played six years for the club, lost his regular place this year but always fighting to regain it.

KOSTAS ATHANASOPOULOS. A left-back and a midfield player when needed. A great clubman a product of the junior team a full international on three occasions. Married. Aged 25.

MIMIS DEMETRIOU. Aged 23 recovered from a great setback to his career with a knee injury that has kept him out of the side for the best part of the current season. An outstanding midfield player and an international on five occasions. Contributed greatly in last year's record championship winning side and an expert penalty taker.

DEMETRI KALIGERIS. Aged 18, left winger, the baby of the side his first year in first-class football offered great services to the club in our European campaign, has a bright future.

FACTS AND FIGURES BEHIND SIXTEEN

*HIS is the 16th European Cup Final. Of the previous 15 there have only been seven different winners: Real Madrid (Spain), six wins; Benfica (Portugal), AC Milan and Internazionale Milan (both Italy), two each; Celtic (Scotland), Feijenoord (Holland) and Manchester United (England) one each,

Spain have the record number of finalists with nine appearances; Real Madrid appearing in eight finals, Barcelona one. Italy are second with seven (AC Milan three, Inter. three, Fiorentina one). Third are Portugal with five, all from Benfica. Holland are providing a finalist for the third successive year, Ajax making their second appearance, Feijenoord having been finalists last year. France and Scotland have two each with Reims and Celtic making two final appearances respectively. One appearance has been made by England with Manchester United, Greece (Panathinaikos), West Germany (Eintracht Frankfurt) and Yugoslavia (Partizan Belgrade).

Alfredo Di Stefano holds the record number of European Cup goals in his career. He scored 49 for Real Madrid. Seven of them came in finals and he scored on each of his five consecutive finals. He hit a hat-trick in the final of 1960.

The record aggregate of goals in a European Champions Club Cup tie is 18 scored by Benfica (Portugal) against Stade Dudelange (Luxembourg) in 1965-66. Ten goals is the highest by one team in one leg. Five teams have achieved this total. In 1956-57 Manchester United beat Anderlecht 10-0, Benfica hit 10 against Dudelange in one leg of the tie mentioned above, Anderlecht beat Valkeakosken (Finland) 10-1 away in 1966-67. Leeds hit 10 without reply from Lyn Oslo in 1969-70 and this season Borussia Monchengladbach (West Germany) beat EPA Larnax 10-0 in 1970-71.

The present season was the first in which Real Madrid did not take part in the European Cup. No other club has been as consistent in the Champions Cup having played nearly 100 matches in the competition. And the Spaniards reached the final of the Cup Winners Cup this term.




