

On the occasions I spoke to him, he was always genial, unassuming and clearly loved the club he spent almost a decade at. For those who worked with him, his friends and his family, it must be even more of a shock.

We remember him today on the pitch, the programme cover, within these pages and in our memories - and it's not too extravagant to suggest that the man who graces one of this football club's most famous photographs will never be forgotten at Stonebridge Road.

When history books are written in the future and when this club's greatest achievements are measured, standing tall amongst them all will be our Wembley-winning skipper Paul McCarthy. RIP Paul.

Chelmsford play Maidenhead on Monday and can close the gap to six points so they'll fancy their chances of making that up. There'll be lots of teams tucked in behind who'll think they've got at least a chance - but if we do our job for the remaining weeks of the season, then it shouldn't matter what they do.

I'd like to welcome John Coventry and his East Thurrock United side and supporters to Stonebridge Road this afternoon. They may have the most draws of any team this season, but they've been quite expansive, open and attacking away from home in the videos I've seen of them. They have some lively players up front who can score goals and we'll have to be alive to that defensively - but then, so will they with our attacking players. Hopefully you'll see an entertaining match this afternoon and we need to be the ones coming out on top.

Finally, this football club lost one of its greatest captains in the weeks since our last home game. I played against Paul McCarthy when I was at Stevenage and followed him into the Ireland youth team, who he had played for 10 years or so before I did. Paul was known in the game to be a fantastic leader and a great professional and person in the changing room. He was obviously a very good player and his terrific career record speaks for itself. It's a tragedy to lose your life so young and I'd like to wish his family all the best at this difficult time for them. And you know from the tributes paid here over the last two weeks that he will also be missed greatly by everyone at Ebbsfleet United.

Thank you for your travelling support this last two weeks. Please get behind us again once more. •



nother week and another calendar month passes us by and in between Fleet and Maidenhead United swapped places a couple of times and are now separated only on alphabetical order. In the meantime, Dartford slackened off the pace a little, Chelmsford did some catching up and with their game in hand (which is against Maidenhead) will fancy themselves for a tilt at the top while Poole Town may not have given up the ghost either just yet. In short, you couldn't get a cigarette paper between the title hopefuls at the moment, making it perhaps the most open season for many a year at the top of the table.

East Thurrock United are the next hurdle in the Fleet's way, the second newly promoted side in succession here at Stonebridge Road. It is the Rocks' first ever visit to our stadium as they consolidate at the highest position in their 48-year history.

A very good start to the season saw John Coventry's side hovering just below the play-offs but their fondness for a draw has probably curtailed their chances somewhat. With 12 draws this season they are by some distance the single-point specialists, proving very hard to beat - though recently have only drawn one of their last 10 games. Dartford, Chelmsford, Maidenhead and ourselves have all

been shut out by the Rocks this season and Fleet must be hoping to emulate the Darts who turned an away draw into a 6-1 home win back in January.

That remains East Thurrock's low point of a season that has seen them take to the National League South like ducks to water. With an experienced and proven strike force in Sam Higgins and James Walker, goals from midfield courtesy of Tom Wraight, plus know-how in the back line from the likes of Lee Burns and Ben Wood, the Rocks are plenty capable of holding their own.


Added to those players is recent loan capture from Dagenham & Redbridge, Scott Heard, who Steve Brown had once been keen to sign for the Fleet from Whitstable Town.

Since last we met both goalscorers have moved on (Kane Ferdinand to Woking, Stuart Lewis to Maidstone) while the visitors have also seen Joe Ellul depart to join the Billericay revolution and Teddy Nesbitt to Hornchurch. Defender Ryan Sammons has been out with a collar bone injury for several months but is nearing fitness.


For the Fleet, Dean Rance begins the first of a two-match suspension for 10 yellow cards, meaning this will be the first league match since late September in which he hasn't featured. •



He has Conference South experience with Chelmsford City, Concord Rangers and Bromley but has always viewed East Thurrock as his spiritual football home and has enjoyed his goalscoring success there - and passed an incredible 200 goals in 235 games for the Rocks this time last year.


MarvinEkpiteta

Ben carved out a name for himself at Conference South level with clubs including Thurrock and he then joined the Rocks where he played a big role in guiding them back to the Ryman Premier Division. He has "retired" twice in recent seasons but has come back to help out the club when they have had defensive problems. A firefighter by trade and a genuine East Thurrock United legend.

Signed after leaving Margate following their Ryman League Premier promotion at the end of the 2014/15 season, during which he suffered a serious injury that sidelined him for a lengthy spell. George had signed for the Gate from Northampton Town after a previous season on work experience from the Cobblers at Welling where he helped the Wings win the Conference South title and promotion.



MichaelFreiter

An addition to the Rocks' midfield core of young, exciting players, 20-year-old Michael cut his footballing teeth coming through the ranks at Gillingham but was released in the close season. He has featured in 22 matches for the Rocks this season.



ReeceHarris

Reece returned to East Thurrock after playing for two seasons with Welling United in the National League. He joined the Wings from the Rocks where he had proved a very big hit with local fans. Previous clubs include Concord Rangers.



ScottHeard

A player who Fleet fans might remember when Steve Brown attempted to sign him from Whitstable Town after he impressed in our FA Trophy game against them. Scott moved on to Folkestone Invicta after starring for the Oystermen and from there he was signed by John Still for Dagenham & Redbridge last October. The dynamic wide midfielder has played eight times for the Daggers this season before moving on an initial month's loan to East Thurrock in February.

With loans from the FA, Thurrock Council and Greene King, the club – by now in the Essex Senior League – buys their current site at Rookery Hill, Corringham

Highly rated young midfielder who graduated through the West Ham United youth ranks before joining hometown club Chelmsford City. He joined the Rocks last February and was influential in the final stages of the promotion-winning season.



SimonPeddie

A Montserrat international and recent signing who has played for numerous clubs around the M25 including Cheshunt, Boreham Wood, Redbridge and Leyton. He returned recently from a dual registration arrangement at Tilbury.



KyeRuel

A highly versatile player with an eye for goal who has returned to Rookery Hill after an earlier spell. He includes Leiston, Witham Town and Aveley among previous clubs. He suffered a broken leg in last season's play-off semi-final but is now back in the squad.



HarryHonesty

Pacy midfielder or striker with a real eye for goal. He has flirted at several levels of the non-league game but emerged as a useful asset for the Rocks during the run-in to the play-offs last season and remains a very bright prospect.



JamesWalker

A much travelled and experienced striker. The former England U18 began his career with Charlton and has since played for Hartlepool United, Bristol Rovers, Leyton Orient, Notts County and Yeovil Town on loan before joining Southend United. After a loan spell at Gillingham he signed for Woking in 2011 and then played for Dover Athletic and Eastbourne Borough. He was called up to play for Antigua & Barbuda in a 2014 World Cup qualifier. In 2013 he moved to Australia to play in the Brisbane Premier League for Albany Creek Excelsior before returning to Eastbourne in 2014 before moving to the Rocks in the summer after a spell at Bishop's Stortford.

Thurrock, FC Reno and Arnett Gardens in Jamaica and, finally, Maldon & Tiptree. He made

little impression at most of those clubs, with only Hendon, AFC Wimbledon and Maldon seeing much in the way of a goal return. His LinkedIn profile lists him currently as a football coach.








Bradley Bubb's second-half winner returned Fleet to the top of the table albeit on alphabetical order – as the visitors came away from Twerton Park with their first win in five years.

As ever in Somerset, it was a tough three points though Fleet had the late luxury of hitting the post in time added on through Anthony Cook, who was the first change in Daryl McMahon's starting lineup for five games, as he came in for Sean Shields.

It was a fairly tepid opening though things heated up when George Rigg clattered into Dean Rance and earned a yellow card for his troubles as early as the sixth minute, having departed Stonebridge Road with a similar caution back in October.

Nick McCootie was lively for the visitors early on but Fleet gradually imposed themselves on midfield. The first decent chance didn't come until the 15th minute, however, from a promising free-kick position, but Danny Kedwell blasted his effort into the wall. Kedwell had the next chance too when his header was off target from an Andy Drury corner and Bubb fired wide after a good turn to get past Chas Hemmings but the ball skipped away from him as he shot.

Fleet continued to edge it and Sam Deering set Bubb free for a shot wide before the favour was returned with Deering squeezing between two defenders only to see his effort blocked by goalkeeper Max O'Leary. And shortly before half-time, the goalkeeper was again called into action when he had to tip a Kedwell header over the bar, the Fleet skipper then depositing the corner in the same place moments later.

Bath weren't without their chances and Bristol City Ioanee Shaun McCoulsky flashed one across goal

while Andy Watkins' header at the back post might have caused problems had the home side followed up his header. As it was, Nathan Ashmore wasn't unduly tested and it gave Fleet a platform to build on for the second half.

And the visitors didn't take too long to go about their job after the restart. Four minutes in, Rigg was inexplicably casual with a back header from an Ashmore goal kick and Bubb's reaction was swift, racing on to the loose ball and delivering a great lob over O'Leary who was completely stranded and could only watch as it hit the target.

Fleet really piled the pressure on for a period after the goal and one corner produced a goalmouth scramble that was cleared while Kedwell planted another ball over the top.

City won their first corner on 66 minutes and from it McCootie rifled a shot just wide; it heralded a spell of possession for the home side but no real danger for the Fleet. Certainly Ashmore was a lot busier but he claimed the aerial balls well while in front of him, Dave Winfield and Kenny Clark held off the challenge of the Bath strikers.

After a scrappy 20 minutes, the score really could have risen in the closing stages. First Bath carved out their best opportunity as Shaquille Hunter went agonisingly close, a curling shot deflected past the post. Moments later, with time running out, Fleet had a golden opportunity to put the game to bed when Bath's defence went walkabout and Cook sped into the clear, rounded O'Leary but saw his shot from an angle bounce back off the post. Deering then tried an audacious effort from the halfway line (and he has form for that) with O'Leary out of his goal but the keeper managed to hasten back and clear off the line with his leg.

ot too many non-league fans will get to say they saw one of their own lift a trophy at Wembley. It was our finest sporting hour - and it was probably his, too. In 70 years of a succession of immense Fleet club captains, Paul McCarthy - the man who is etched in our all-too-recent memory holding that piece of silverware aloft - will in all likelihood stand tallest of them all. Here, we recall his career and in the following pages, run tributes sent in to us by


Liam Daish, Ross Smith, Brian Kilcullen, Jason Botley and Roly Edwards, together with some of the many tweets published in Paul's memory...

Paul McCarthy was born on 4th August, 1971, in the Irish city of Cork - six days before Roy Keane, who also hailed from the same place. Paul played gaelic football and hurling but the two budding young sportsmen played U12-U16 soccer together for Rockmount AFC, a junior club local to Cork, from the early Eighties and they progresssed together. When Keane won the



two moved up to U15 Ireland level together, eventually
appearing side by side in the Irish U21 lineup.

INTO THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Paul made the move to England
18 months earlier than Keane,
landing on these shores aged
just 16 in the summer of 1988 to
take up an apprenticeship with
Brighton & Hove Albion, then in the
Second Division (equivalent to the
Championship). Within two years
he had progressed to the first team
and, appropriately enough, played
the first game of what was to be a 19year career on St Patrick's Day, 1990.

He enjoyed six more years with Brighton (pictured right), all of them in the reorganised Second Division (now League One), during which time he captained the club and was voted Ireland's U21 player of the year. As an Irish youth international, he collected 10 caps, playing in the





World Youth finals in 1991

in Portugal. In 1996, it was on to Wycombe Wanderers for a fee of £100,000 where he played at League One level. His most memorable season for the Chairboys was, of course, their FA Cup run of 2000/01 when

his goals were instrumental in Wycombe's progression. In Round Two, he scored the winner against Millwall with an overhead kick of all things! He added another to keep Wanderers in the competition in Round Three, in a 1-1 draw against Grimsby Town and scored again in the replay.

He netted a last-minute winner to keep the club in the competition against Wimbledon in the Fifth Round before firing home a penalty in the 8-7 shootout) and grabbed a memorable fifth of the competition alongside another future Fleet man in Roy Essandoh (*left*) to dump Leicester City out at the quarter-final stage. Paul then featured in the semi-final against Liverpool at



Anfield, faced with keeping Robbie Fowler and Michael Owen quiet.

After a spell at Oxford United in 2003/04, he first became acquainted with our fans when he helped lower-league Hornchurch knock out a Fleet side including Andy Drury and Jay Saunders in the 2004/05 FA Cup.

INTO THE FLEET

Yet within a month of that game, Paul was a Fleet player. With a financial crisis engulfing the Urchins across the river, Andy Ford swooped to sign him for the Fleet (having failed to do so in the summer) to fill a defensive gap and he came across the Thames with Hornchurch teammate, little-known Serbian Zeljko Popovic, who became his first if somewhat short-lived central defensive partner at the club.

A lot happened in his first season at the club. Andy Ford lasted only two more months in the job and Paul was suddenly handed the reins of caretaker manager alongside another 'Macca' - Steve McKimm – for a period of three games until Liam Daish was appointed in February 2005. Perhaps it was fate given the close association of the two men that followed, but Paul scored the first goal at Stonebridge Road of the Liam Daish era against

Tamworth, a week after the manager's appointment.

Paul had numerous defensive partners that season including Popovic, Chris Moore, Nathan Bunce and Graham Porter before sustaining an injury in an FA Trophy quarter-final at Bishop's Stortford in March which ruled him out for the rest of that season.

came in, a period that wasn't without the problems of any such transition.

In 2005/06, he played 37 games, welcoming new partners in defence in Ross Smith and James Smith and the following season, added 42 more games as Fleet just missed out on the Conference play-offs.

Shorn of reliable comrade Ross Smith in 2007/08 who had departed to Dagenham & Redbridge, Paul turned in his most memorable season in a Fleet shirt, scoring his only goal of the season in the FA Trophy semi-final v Aldershot. It was a crucial goal against the Conference champions-elect, coming just two minutes after the Shots had given themselves a lifeline at 2-1; Paul's goal kept them at bay and gave Fleet a solid foundation in the second leg.

He was overwhelmingly voted player of the year across three award categories (see box, right) and you could see why when his experience got Fleet through a rather nervous and shaky opening at Wembley against Torquay United. The Fleet ultimately rode the early discomfort thanks largely to Paul's marshalling of the defence and the rest - with Paul and the injured Danny Slatter lifting the Trophy – is, of course, history.

There was no let up in 2008/09, with Paul still managing 23 games despite being laid up over most of the autumn and winter with injury, though he didn't manage to appear in any of Fleet's games in defence of their Trophy title. The Fleet skipper was clearly eyeing coaching roles, however, and alongside Ian Docker he began to bring through some of the club's young players via the PASE scheme, most noticeably Michael West.

INTO THE DUGOUT

It was little surprise, then, upon the departure of Alan Kimble in the summer of 2009 that Paul stepped up to assist Liam Daish. Having all but hung up his boots, he signed on as a player for 2009/10 intending only to be used for emergencies. He added five last appearances that season, four of them defeats, as Fleet's young and largely untested squad initially struggled to come to

Player of the Year 2007/08

Fleet fans might recall how Paul's haul of the endof-season awards in our Trophy season went a little bit awry. Having bagged all three player of the year trophies on offer, it was decided to present them all to him just before the final game of the league season at home to Oxford United.

So picture the scene - poor old Macca runs out to take up his accustomed spot on the edge of the box before a PA announcement has him trotting back over to the tunnel to receive his supporters' player of the year trophy. Repeat this scene twice more as he had to run off and return to pocket two more trophies and it was little wonder that within 30 seconds of the whistle, the Fleet defence was all over the place and had gone 1-0 behind. By the half-hour mark, it was 3-0 to Oxford and Macca – presumably feeling the effects of all that silver polish from the pre-match festivities - was substituted at half-time.

Thankfully, it all had a happy ending as two weeks later he was picking up an even more important trophy at Wembley. Suffice to say, however, I don't think player of the year awards were ever again given out before kick-off under Liam Daish!

terms with some very good opponents.

His first and last seasons as assistant to Liam were amongst the most trying in the club's recent history. The 2008/09 campaign saw much of the core of Fleet's successful side leave as MyFC renewals nosedived and the club's income went with them. CEOs and chairmen came and went but somehow the ship was steadied and Liam and Paul built a promotion squad from the ashes in 2010/11. The



disappointment of relegation at Tamworth was surpassed by the sight of Liam and Paul with a second trophy in their hands the following spring.

A first season back in the Conference in 2011/12 saw Fleet breeze clear of relegation by quite some distance, finishing 14th – with standout performances by Michael West, a Paul McCarthy protégé who was sold to Crewe Alexandra that summer.

But in Paul and Liam's final season, the financial chickens again came home to roost and Fleet – along with many of the players and management – were running on empty by the end of 2012/13. Pretty much already relegated in April 2013, the troubles were summed up during a farcical trip to Barrow

when a beans spillage on the motorway contributed to the team arriving late for an evening kick-off and eventually completing the game past 11.00pm. One assumes these were the moments, getting home the following morning at 8.30am with the club in such straits and the future uncertain, that Liam Daish referred

to when he praised Paul McCarthy's spirit in adversity.

With the management pair's departure from

Stonebridge Road, Paul even donned his boots again
to play and coach for his local club Crowborough

Athletic at Sussex County League level.

INTO OUR HISTORY

Paul's time at Stonebridge Road straddled several eras at the Fleet – he began under Andy Ford when we were a club simply trying to stay afloat in the big pond of the Conference; he held together a side under Liam Daish that would just miss out on the play-offs and win the FA Trophy; he was skipper as MyFC arrived; and then he suffered relegation, rebirth and relegation once more that brought this club to the brink. The





The Big Men

LIAM DAISH WORKED WITH PAUL FOR EIGHT YEARS. HERE, IN HIS OWN WORDS, HE REMEMBERS HIS COLLEAGUE AND FRIEND



irstly I'd like to thank Ed Miller for allowing me to write this tribute to my mate Macca. It's an absolute privilege and honour to do so, even though I can't believe I am.

When I joined Gravesend & Northfleet as manager, my first task was to meet the players on a training night down at a local school. I walked into the changing room alone looking for Macca as he was the only player I really knew from my time of playing the game - and I needed someone I could at least relate to even though I had never met him personally or even spoken to him. But playing against him was at least a start to what became a long working and personal relationship.

I remember to this day he stood up in that changing room, walked towards me with his shoulders back and his chest out and offered me his hand to shake, which I obliged. If you ever shook Paul's hand you will understand what I mean by

saying it left an impression on me - literally! "Good to meet you gaffer," he said straight away. I felt at ease within the group. Paul made me feel at ease, which he was very good at.

Paul soon became my captain, and what a captain he was for this football club. His performances and the way he conducted himself on and off the pitch were all you could ask for from your skipper. He had a great manner about him and he set himself a high standard in his performances and how he trained. His relationship, as skipper, with the other players was perfect. The players not only respected him as a player and as a man, they loved him as well. He looked after them; he guided them and looked out for them. Although being an old pro who was coming to the end of his career, Paul could connect with the youngest of players in the squad and make them feel part of everything; that is a real quality.

When he played he left nothing in the tank and played the game as it should be played - with

honesty, commitment and with a personal pride in his performance.

He was a fierce competitor and a winner.

Although not the quickest or tallest for a central defender he was rarely caught out as he read the game so well and sniffed out danger very early which is so important for a defender.

I believe Paul made the absolute most of the talent he was given as a player. He was a great professional, his attitude was first class and his effect on those around him were second to none.

As you all know in 2008 the club reached the FA Trophy Final and went on to win it in front of 40,000 people. Without Paul in the side, I believe we wouldn't have. The team was so young and inexperienced and needed a real leader and in Macca they had one.

I know if you speak to any player who played with Paul they will back me up in what I have just said, I'm absolutely positive of that.

At the final whistle of the final, Paul - off his own back - grabbed Danny Slatter, who had injured his knee badly and missed the latter part of that season, and led him up the Wembley steps to collect the Trophy with him. That was a mark of the man.

I really got to know Paul as a person when he became my assistant. We enjoyed many highs whilst we worked together and went through some tough times in really difficult circumstances also.

Throughout, Paul always remained on the level. He never wanted to get involved in the politics that became a daily battle at times but he was always there to listen and give me support if it was getting me down.

I have many great memories of my time at this club and Paul, along with Ron Hillyard, is a major reason why I have so many. I used to love to listen to the two of them go at each other on the bus, arguing over something trivial. The Irishman had strong views, especially on sport, and would keenly back them up – and with Ron being a stubborn Yorkshireman, it made for great viewing.

I shared many a pint of the black stuff with Macca after a game, win or lose, and sometimes a cheeky cigar if the result had been the right one. It became tradition.

I miss being around good men like Paul and Ron.

Macca was a man you don't meet every day. He was a proud Irishman, a devoted father and husband, a good solid player and a man you could trust and rely on. I will miss him.

My thoughts are with his family... his wife Cath and his beautiful daughters Erin, Libby, Scarlett and Cassidy, who Paul idolised. His legacy will live on in those girls. Till we meet again, Big Man... X. O

want to be the next Macca. Not the next Ronaldo or Messi.... Macca." If one day I have a son with soccer ambitions, I hope these will be his words, and that this will be the man he will choose to emulate.

With my son on my lap, I will show him videos of how this lion of a man played the game, and how he led a group of young men, week in and out, into battle. I will tell him stories of how this man carried himself off the pitch, how every individual he came into contact with was a better person for it.

One day when he is old enough, I will surprise my son with a trip to England... to Gravesend. Walking into Stonebridge Road, into the home team's changing room, I will point to the seat where, on game day, Macca would sit, one leg crossed over the other quietly going through the programme, reading it word for word, occasionally picking his head up to listen, smile and for a second join in on the banter going on in the dressing room. How he would return to his programme and quietly keep an ear out to monitor the young men around him to make sure the locker room was right.

I will recall the story of when I gave a bad ball away at training and Macca dug me out. Sharply I spoke back to Macca and I remember the look he gave me and how frighteningly quiet he went, seemingly making a mental note. The next chance he had in the small-sided game, he put his studs right through me, consequently leaving us both laying on the pitch, hurt, each holding our leg. The training ground went completely silent, and Liam Daish looked on with a wry smile. The gaffer knew what that was all about. He knew that was his captain restoring order. Picking ourselves up off the ground and hobbling in for treatment, for the next hour together, not one word was said. Finally, I felt a gentle hand on my shoulder and a strong Irish rasp voice say, "You okay son?" A question to show how much he cared, and a message left in my leg to let me know that is one battle never to take on again.

As I walk out into the tunnel with my son, I will tell of a man who stood at the front of the line wearing the armband. His broad shoulders

seemingly blocking any light from outside entering in, as he stood in a calm stance looking out onto the pitch. The confidence he exuded carried right through the line of his teammates knowing that our

leader, who now seemingly stood 7 feet tall in front walking us onto the pitch, wouldn't let us down... ever.

Standing on the pitch, I will recount the time I stuck my head in to win a knee-high ball, only because I heard Macca shout, 'Head it!', resulting in a broken nose as my face met a foot. I always did what the voice called out for from behind me though - because it was always right. Even if it did mean a knock or an injury now and again, you put a foot or a head into things for the sake of the team... for Macca. He understood that a pail gets filled by a million little drops, and that each and every tackle and battle builds a win.

To turn to him after hearing the referee's final whistle, knowing we had just won a game 1-0, with a steely look in his eye, firm clench of the fist and forceful grind of the teeth, you could see how proud of you he was. To this day there is no better feeling in this world.

Going back inside, I will recollect with great admiration and respect, how after games, while the rest of the lads lollygagged and bragged and bantered in the changing room, Macca was always the first out the door, showered, offering up "Well done lads, see you Monday," as he raced out the door eager to return to his family.

Now and again, Macca would coach the next day, and so he would ask if he could stay with Aaron Kerr, my brother and I at the players' house across the road on Railway Street.

When I walk across the street with my son, I will remember that these were the best nights. With Stellas in hand, and countless stories on the lips, we would talk in our tiny, barely furnished living room until the early hours of the morning. We never did talk about the game that was just played. If we did, it was brief. Macca wanted to talk about other things. The best moments of the night were when he

> talked about his 'girls' - his wife and four daughters. He showed me what it meant to be a good family man. He showed me a different side to a person that a few hours before was fiercely competing; he showed me what

it meant to be a devoted father, husband and true friend now gently chatting.

After the "memory lane" tour and stories with my son, I will have to be aware that he may feel overwhelmed with the size of boots he would have to fill in order to emulate this once warrior. But I won't drop the standards. Macca never once did.

While I'm sure my eyes will continue to fill with tears for years to come every time I think of Macca - as they are now while I write this note - I will quickly become grateful for the time I had with him, for the footballing path that led me to him. Macca showed me how to live my life in the same way the game should be played, with honour, loyalty, pride, dedication, unwavering love and uncompromising strength.

Rest in peace Macca.

ost of us unfortunately get word of something dreadful from time to time, but the sad news about Paul McCarthy was an absolute shocker. Myself and fellow directors and colleagues at the club were lucky enough to get to know Paul as a player and a coach, but also as a person. When we recruited "Macca", he was a big signing for the club. His ability and track record were above the level we normally recruited at and, naturally enough, his wages would reflect that. Our wage budget was not high and we were a little nervous about the outlay. We had nothing to worry about, of course, as he went on to become our FA Trophy-winning captain, did a great job coaching the Youth Team and struck up a formidable and successful partnership with Liam Daish in the role of first-team coach. We have great memories of the football achievements along with the post-match discussions and socialising.

ONE OF OUR FINEST MEN // BY ROLY EDWARDS



A lot has been written in recent days but Paul truly was one of the nicest men you could wish to meet and it is so hard to comprehend that he is no longer with us.

My first memory of him was as an opponent

when we played Hornchurch in the FA Cup in 2004. He was awesome that day, so strong and powerful and clearly a natural leader. I can recall him rising to head a ball goalward, the ball unluckily crashing against the bar... I swear that

bar is still shaking today! Surely this was a player that we could only aspire to have at our club... little did I know that only a few weeks later he would be joining us. I knew from the start that we had we signed an excellent player but what I didn't realise was how much he would enhance the lives of everyone around him as years progressed. His intelligence, mental strength and physical toughness always shone through but he also had an air of calmness and was a very gentle man too. He gained respect for all the right reasons and he had charm in equal measure.

He grew into our club and made it his own...

Paul was a proud Irishman who loved sport and in particular to chat about the Irish rugby team. But despite this, it wasn't from him you would hear that he had played U21 international football and was a regular teammate of Roy Keane. He was mod-

est and unassuming. There was no ego with him.

Leadership and presence are also what you associate with Paul. He was an uncompromising centre half who used his top-level professional experience to great effect with the Fleet. Off the pitch, he had a generous spirit and would put himself out for people. Despite only having had four hours sleep in two days, he once made the effort to drive a good distance to attend a special party for one of the directors. It turned out the reason he had so little sleep was that he was doing a work favour for another friend.

Paul dealt with things in a calm and assured way. Forgive me a personal memory, but I remember when my youngest child, TJ, was to be a mascot for the Fleet at the age of two (pictured above).



Most footballers would be a little nervous about looking after a mascot so young. We wondered whether the occasion may be too much for TJ and half expected him to duck out at the last minute and not go out on the pitch. We needn't have worried. Paul just

grasped him up in his arms, strolled on to the pitch, conducted the pre-match formalities and then had a one-to-one kickabout with him until the game kicked off. A lovely moment for a little lad and his family, but Paul made it look easy.

Above all he was a family man. We will all miss him for different reasons: but of course it is as nothing compared to the sorrow his family must be feeling. Our thoughts are with them and we hope the fact that Paul is a Fleet legend and so respected, both as a person and a player, will provide a little degree of comfort to them over the coming weeks and months. 0

longside my memories of Paul as an outstanding player and leader of the first team, are those spent with him and Docks [Ian Docker] focused upon the development of the club's academy players - which at the time was known as the PASE team. His professionalism

and dedication to the development of many young lads over the years - not only from footballing perspective, but also in terms of personal skills (good manners, discipline, high standards, strong work ethic, courtesy

and respectfulness) - was second to none.

He did this through his coaching ability, but also by the way he conducted himself. He led by example. He was extremely proud of the academy lads and wanted them all to maximise their potential. He had the balance right when coaching them

in terms of being focused, firm when needed, but also making things enjoyable. He was demanding (rightly so) of the club and the school in terms of facilities, he wanted the best environment for them to succeed and would not hold back if he believed things could be improved to

achieve this.

Paul had a positive impact on so many people, influencing the development of young men into adulthood. Many of whom did not carve out careers in football, but all of whom

would have greatly benefited from his instruction, support and guidance. He was a truly inspiration-

al man and his legacy will live on through those he touched. O
