SALFORD CITY

The Laithwaite Community Stadium Pre-Season Friendly Attendance: 722

A NEAR-450 mile round-trip to Woking is a long way for a pre-season friendly, but it is the sort of journey that Salford City will have to get used to in The National League. If that habit can extend to include the 1-0 result as a minimum then it will be a very healthy habit to adopt.

Defender Carl Piergianni - or "Blonde top-knot" as Woking's poor Twitter-commentator had to refer to him as owing to confusion over player identities with Salford bearing un-numbered shirts - headed the winning goal in the second half from a Tom Walker free-kick, and helped at the back as The Ammies kept their first clean sheet of pre-season.

Danny Lloyd made his first appearance in a Salford shirt and it was the former Stockport County forward's contribution that nearly got the game off to a perfect start for Salford when he lofted in a corner from the right-hand side which found Piergianni at the back post, and the defender's downwards header was goal-bound until a clearance off the line by a Woking defender.

Lloyd would continue to show his quality throughout the afternoon and wriggled forward to get a shot off in the eighth minute, but it was blocked by the hosts.

Set pieces presented multiple opportunities for the visitors throughout the afternoon, one would be particularly telling, but The Ammies could have gone in at half-time with a lead after Liam Hogan twice headed over Lloyd corners as Salford finished the half strongly, and a lead would not have been an unfair reflection on first half proceedings.

Woking were helped by the introduction of Reggie Young who broke down the left and got a dangerous cross in from the left which was headed towards fellow substitute Duane Ofori-Acheampong, but Piergianni got a block in and Salford cleared their lines.

The former Boston United centre-back nearly turned provider a minute later as a perfectly pinged ball down the right-hand side fell and bounced perfectly for Rory Gaffney. The Irishman took the shot first time on the half-volley, but was denied by Berti Schotterl as the ball

ran for a corner. Lloyd delivered from the right-hand side and Piergianni had got himself up, but his header was narrowly over the bar.

Past the hour mark Salford started to strengthen their grip on the game again with Walker again testing Schotterl from range, and substitute Nick Haughton took on a shot from a free-kick on the left-hand side of the area but it flashed across goal, needing either a deft header or a bit more curl.

Schotterl had to be alert in the 76th minute and pulled off a very picturesque diving save to deny Trialist a goal from a well-hit shot, but there was little he could do a couple of minutes later. Walker was barged over on the right-hand side by Josh Casey and promptly picked himself up to take the resulting free-kick. It was whipped in with good pace, and Piergianni was on the end to meet it and head past the helpless Woking goalkeeper.

Lois Maynard had marshalled the midfield impeccably for most of the game, and had a sight of goal late on. He controlled the ball well with his chest and hit the shot on the volley, but unfortunately it went wide otherwise his second goal of pre-season would have been a spectacular

A fair result in a match that The Ammies controlled well against a side who battled in The National League last season. Good luck to The Cards for the 2018-19 season!

SALFORD CITY

The J. Davidson Stadium Pre-Season Friendly Attendance: 898

A STRIKE from Rory Gaffney and a late own goal gave Salford City victory in their final warm-up game of the summer, with Altrincham's reply coming from a certain Jordan Hulme, A decent afternoon's entertainment at the J. Davidson Stadium with some good football for the near 900 crowd to enjoy.

Mark Shelton had the first sight of goal just three minutes in but after being played in by Nick Haughton he couldn't hit the target.

The Robins were looking spritely too, giving an experienced Salford defence plenty to think about during the early stages. With a guarter of an hour played fullback Andy White pushed forward on the right before

slipping a low ball into the near post. Josh Hancock - who had a pre-season with Salford a few years ago - got in a first-time effort that was blocked by Max Crocombe.

Soon after that Brendan Daniels' corner from the right found Jake Moult but from 12 yards out he planted a header high over the bar. The Ammies broke guickly through Danny Lloyd whose low 18-varder wasn't all that far wide.

A Haughton corner was headed just over by Jake Lawlor in the 31st minute but by this stage of the game both sides' attacking efforts were marked more by intent than achievement. It looked as if the half would end without a goal until Salford struck out of the blue less than two minutes before the break. Haughton was the architect, carrying possession inside from the left prior to picking out Gaffney. A good first touch was followed up by an even better finish as the former Bristol Rovers man tucked a low effort inside Tony Thompson's left-hand post.

A narrow advantage for the Ammies but as local luminary Frank Sidebottom wisely observed, "The Robins aren't bobbins". Salford started the second half positively as a Haughton corner from the right was headed over by Nathan Pond. The next action of note would produce an equaliser for the home side.

A brief spell of Alty pressure led to a low Hancock shot that Crocombe pushed onto the inside of his right-hand post The ball ran back almost along the goal-line and the race was on to get to it first. Since this friendly was announced Salford fans had been predicting a goal from Hulme and he gleefully proved them correct, sliding in at the far post to lift the ball into the back of the net.

An equaliser Altrincham probably deserved but they very nearly went behind again within a minute or two. Haughton received a low forward pass on the left, turning away from Alty's James Jones before advancing on goal. In full flow the ex-Fleetwood man is difficult to stop and here he did what he does so well, slaloming away from a couple of challenges before cutting inside, a vard outside the area. The approach work deserved a goal but it wasn't to be as a right-footer flew narrowly wide of Thompson's left-hand stick.

With 12 minutes to play Salford edged back into the lead although it took a stroke of good fortune to get them there. Haughton pushed forward on the left before playing a neat cross into the penalty area. It was a decent enough delivery but there seemed to be little danger until Alty's James Jones - stretching all the way - diverted the ball past Wynne and inside his left-hand post from six-vards

In hindsight the defender should probably have left that one but the damage had been done. The last dozen minutes or so would be fairly quiet with Haughton's effort from distance the closest Salford would come to a third.

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FRANKLY SPEAKING

This week, Frankly re-calls the last time he saw Leyton Orient play and how teams have moved up and down the league pyramid.

So. how was that for a closed season? From a Salford perspective it could most certainly be termed as having been a headline grabbing one.

Since winning the National League North back in April it has been something of a hectic - and well documented - period for everyone connected with the Peninsula

Joint managers Bernard and Jonno have gone. It would have been nice to have seen how they might have fared on the National scene but tough calls get made in football and they left us in the knowledge that they have been our most successful management team in our time as a semi-professional/full-time club over the last 30-odd years. We wish them all the best with Chester FC in the upcoming campaign.

And so we welcome and give our full support in the hot seat to Graham Alexander and Chris Lucketti. Their appointments were certainly a statement of intent by the club. As were the high profile signings on the playing front. Added together they constituted enough reason for verbal and written assaults to be fired in our direction once again.

Personally I find these attacks are becoming wearisome. If I restrict myself to the world of non league football I remain convinced that there is not one club across the country where the Owners/Directors/Committee would have turned their backs on the unexpected opportunity which came Salford's way close to five years ago. Football is in a continuous state of change. You want the proof? Check the various League listings from 10, 40 and more years ago and see who have risen or fallen.

For instance... The last time I saw today's opposition 'in the flesh' was on the final Saturday of the 1986-87 season. They were playing at Burnley in the Fourth Division - what is now known as League 2. It was the first time for end of season play-offs and for automatic promotion and relegation. Orient (as they were then known) were sitting in seventh spot in the Division while their hosts were rock bottom propping up the whole Football League.


Turf Moor's average attendance that season had been 3,257. A lot more were rammed in that afternoon delaying the kick off by 15 minutes - and somehow myself and two friends were amongst them. To stay up Burnley needed to win and hope results elsewhere went in their favour. Their programme referred to the match as 'the most important game in the Club's long history'.

As it turned out they won by two goals to one (something like a preguel to Salford's Great Escape of the 2008-09 season) and Lincoln City went down instead to the

Alan Comfort scored Orient's goal that day and they brought a travelling support of 800 fans to the match. That same season Salford finished bottom of the North West Counties League Division 2 having won just one league match all season and amassing the grand total of 10 points.

Fast forward 30 years and look at how the fortunes of the three clubs have changed. Such is football. For everyone associated with Salford City FC today is truly a momentous occasion, our first fixture at the pinnacle of the Non-League Pyramid.

It's been a long time coming. Let's enjoy it!

JAMES HOOPER SIGNS

SALFORD CITY completed the signing of James Hooper this week after a successful trial period at the club including a few appearances in pre-season friendlies as a trialist.

Wythenshawe-born Hooper is a graduate of Rochdale's youth academy, turning professional at Spotland in 2015. Loan spells at FC United and Stockport County followed and James left Rochdale having made one appearance for the club.

In 2017 he signed a short-term deal with Carlisle United, making nine appearances and scoring once before leaving the Cumbrians that summer.

At the start of the 2017-18 campaign the 21-year-old signed for FC United, playing 10 times before moving to Radcliffe Borough at the end of September. He spent the rest of last season at Stainton Park before being offered a trial by Salford manager Graham Alexander.

After signing, he said:

"Yeah I'm very excited to be here, I can't wait to get started. There's a lot of attractions about this place, the club itself, its ambition and the direction it's heading in is all very attractive.

"This year I wanted to get back into full-time football and I've done that so I'm looking forward to seeing how far this club can go.

"It's a great bunch of lads and the gaffer's really good to work with. We've done a lot of hard work over the last few weeks and I think it's just in time for the season to start so I'm excited to see what happens."

NLP Writer Matt Badcock discusses the new season and the potential introduction of sin bins as a punishment.

THE NEW SEASON

The play-offs get into full swing immediately, then there's all the finals to cover, restructuring, league constitutions, league constitutions part two, transfers, fixtures, FA Cup, Trophy and Vase draws and, eventually, pre-season matches.

But there's nothing quite like that first Saturday of the new campaign. Where everyone turns up, level on points, full of hope and ambition, with fans wondering, 'Could this be our year?'

SIN BINS

Could we see the use of Sin Bins throughout the Non-League Pyramid in the future? Last season the FA trialled the punishment across 31 leagues at various levels and this year that will be expanded with the plan for every Step 7 and below league to use them from 2019-20.

The FA chose to use sin bins solely for dissent. Did you know that one in four yellow cards is given for that offence? And last season's Pilot showed a significant reduction of 38%.

It seems to be tackling the problem.

The hope is sin bins will change behaviour because it will have an immediate impact. Backchat will see a player spend 10 minutes on the sidelines (eight minutes for games of 80 minutes or less) and will harm the team straightaway, rather than receive a booking and carry on.

The FA's Head of Judicial Services, Mark Ives, answered questions on the system as part of our monthly NLP column with the governing body.

He explained how the FA are governed by the International Football Association Board (IFAB) when it comes to laws of the game. At the moment, they are only allowed to introduce it at the grass-roots level.

But should that change, I wonder if we'll see it higher up the ladder. If it works, which it seems to, that can only be a good thing.

LEYTON ORIENT

CLUB HISTORY

LEYTON ORIENT were founded in 1881 by a group of boys who played under the guise of Glyn Cricket Club at Glyn Road. before changing their name to Eagle Cricket Club in 1886.

Two years later, player Jack Dearing suggested that the club re-named Orient Football Club and thus a football section of the club was started. The moniker 'Orient' came from Dearing working for the Orient Steamship & Navigation Company.

Orient joined the Clapton & District League in 1893 and finished third, with the club playing in red shirts with a capital 'O' on their backs, hence being known as The O's. The league was won in 1895, and Orient entered the Third Division of the London League which they were promoted from in 1897 after finishing runners-up.

1898 saw another change in name to Clapton Orient FC in an attempt to give the club more respectability and a bigger fan base; they had already had crowds topping 1,000. 2,500 fans packed in to see the newly re-named club beat Upton Park 6-1 in their first game.

The club became professional in November 1903 after the Middlesex FA stripped them of amateur status in April after finding they had paid a player for pitch works. That was followed up by election into the Second Division of the Southern League in 1904 when Orient finished sixth, and in 1905 the club were elected into the Second Division of the Football League along with Chelsea, Leeds City and Stockport County. They lost their first league match 2-1 at Leicester Fosse, but their first win came against Glossop North End. Orient finished the season bottom of the league, but retained their status after gaining one more vote than Oldham Athletic.

During the First World War, Orient competed in the London Combination, and had the largest enlistment of players in the Footballers' Batallion: 41.

Orient suffered their first relegation in 1929 after finishing bottom, and the next year in Division Three (Southern section) they played their final game at Millfields Road having played there for 30 years. Football would be played at Lea Bridge Road for seven years before a move to current site Brisbane Road in 1937, although the ground was actually called Osborne Road.

League football was suspended during the Second World War and Orient played a number of local matches that totalled 245 between 1939 and 1946. The end of the War also brought an end to Clapton Orient after 48 years and the club re-named as Leyton Orient, with the ground also being re-named Brisbane Road.

The club won it's first Football League promotion in 1955-56 after topping the Division Three South with a club record 106 goals in 46 games. The average home attendance was 16,061.

In April 1962 Orient won promotion to Division One after finishing second to Liverpool, and beating Sunderland to the second promotion spot by one point. The main stand was extended and after losing the opening game to Arsenal, Orient picked up wins against West Ham United, Everton, and a last-minute win against Manchester United. However their stay lasted just a year and 0's were relegated after six wins all season from 42.

Another relegation followed to Division Three, but 1968 marked the introduction of Herb Alpert's Tijuana Taxi as the walkout song, which remains to this day and marks 50 years on August 10th.

Orient were Division Three Champions in 1970 after coming close to relegation in 1969, and missed out on promotion back to Division One in 1974 by a point. 1982 saw a return to Division Three, and 1985 ended in relegation to Division Four.

In 1989 Orient finished in the Division Four play-offs thanks to the inspiration of Kevin Campbell on loan from Arsenal, and a two-legged final win over Wrexham meant the club would be back in Division Three. They signed defender Paul Beesley, father of Salford's Jake, from Wigan Athletic for a then-club record £175,000.

The mid-1990s were a period of financial difficulty after Chairman Tony Wood loses significant money and business interests in the Rwandan Civil War, and Barry Hearn took ownership in March 1995. He couldn't prevent Orient being relegated to Division Three (what was Division Four but now re-named after the introduction of The Premier Leaque).

In 1999 O's reached the play-off final after beating Rotherham United in the semi-final on penalties, but they lost 1-0 to Scunthorpe United at Wembley. Another play-off campaign ended in heartbreak at The Millenium Stadium against Blackpool, the Tangerines winning 4-2.

Promotion was finally achieved in 2005-06 when Orient finished third thanks to a 3-2 victory against Oxford United, which also relegated Oxford to The Conference.

A period of near-success came under Russell Slade who led Orient to seventh in 2012-13, and third in 2013-14 to reach the play-offs. The O's beat Peterborough United 3-2 in the semi-final to book a place against Rotherham United in the final at Wembley. Orient went two goals up before Rotherham came back, and they went on to win the shoot-out 4-3.

Hearn sold the club in June 2014 to Francesco Becchetti, but Orient were relegated from League One in 2014-15 and even worse was to come when they were relegated from the Football League in 2016-17. With that Becchetti sold the club to lifelong 0's fans Nigel Travis.

Orient finished 13th in The National League last season.

CLUB REPORT

O's fans will have been disappointed to see their side finish so far off the play-offs in an attempt to get back into the Football League in 2017-18.

They made a positive start to the season under new manager Steve Davis with five wins and a draw from their first eight league games, but after 11 league games without a win Davis was sacked. Ross Embleton took over as caretaker before the appointment of Justin Edinburgh, who has twice reached the Conference Play-Offs, winning them with Newport County in 2013.

Edinburgh brought some consistency back to Brisbane Road and The O's lost just one of their last eight games to move themselves up the table, but sights will firmly be set on building upon that this season.

Macauley Bonne finished as the league's second top scorer with 22 goals in 2017-18, and Edinburgh has added James Alabi to his front line from Tranmere Rovers. He bagged 18 goals in 46 appearances in 2016-17 at Chester and offers Orient another powerful option up top, where they lacked a little in comparison to other sides around last season.

Orient's other summer signing is midfielder Dale Gorman from Stevenage, who already has over 50 appearances in League Two at just 22.

Pre-Season hasn't been too bad for Justin Edinburgh's side, and plenty of goals have been on the agenda early on; seven against Harlow Town, four against Benfica B and another quadruple at East Thurrock United. Defeat to Benfica B remains their only pre-season defeat having beaten Concord Rangers 3-2 and drawn 1-1 against St. Albans City and 2-2 against League One side Southend United.





IT's perhaps a bit too early to digest much from Leyton Orient's last line-up against Southend in their final pre-season game last Saturday (a 2-2 draw).

Edinburgh made it one of his first changes at the club to revert to a 4-4-2 formation to try and solidify his side, and it looks like something he will stick with after using it in pre-season.



OPPOSITION VIEW

George Sessions is the Leyton Orient correspondent for London Archant, and has been covering the club since 2015.

What is the general vibe about playing Salford amongst the Leyton Orient community?

I think it is quite split, there are some fans who are aware of the work Salford have done in the transfer market this summer and they are a little bit fearful, and others who aren't too bothered about who Orient play, they always expect Orient to win and while that might sound arrogant, it isn't. They just have high expectations of the club and fairly so given it wasn't too long ago they were in League One. A lot of fans are excited to visit a new stadium, but not too pleased it is a 12.30pm kick-off even if they are used to it with BT Sport by now.

What are Leyton Orient's expectations for the season?

I think everyone at the club is expecting to make the playoffs. No one knew what to expect last season and some thought they might romp the league after the first month, but that judgement was misguided. Everyone now knows how difficult the division is and how hard every team is so although a top-seven finish is the aim, everyone associated with Orient knows it will be difficult, but with Justin Edinburgh in charge and stability from top to bottom, there is quiet optimism 0's can have a really good year.

How well prepared do you think Orient are for the new season, and what have you made of the transfer activity?

I think Orient are the best prepared they have been for any season since the start of the 2013-14 season. The last five years have been a rollercoaster of mainly bad, but this summer everything is already in place.

Orient have a manager who knows the league, staff who know the club and a settled group of players who know each other. The hope is this will give them the edge on others who have made wholesale changes and need time to gel. The O's have only made two signings bringing in James Alabi from Tranmere Rovers to strengthen their

forward department and Dale Gorman from Stevenage to increase their competition in the centre of midfield. Both appear decent players; Alabi has shown some flashes of his potential this pre-season while Gorman is only just coming back to full fitness. I personally would have preferred if Orient had signed one or two more quality players, but a nice omen is the last time they made so few signings was the year they nearly sealed promotion to the Championship in the 2013-14 season.

Match Prediction?

I think it will be a tough game for Orient. Salford have a new manager and a lot of new players so need time to gel, but they have obvious quality. This being said, Orient have a strong and experienced squad so I believe it will finish as a 1-1 draw with Josh Koroma scoring for the O's to keep up his stunning form.

What is your favourite Leyton Orient moment?

This is a tricky one because I've mainly seen bad times, largely under the old ownership of Francesco Becchetti. There have been some good times and one of my favourites was probably watching an extremely young and inexperienced O's team win 4-0 at Newport County during the 2016-17 League Two season. Orient went to Rodney Parade with a side mainly full of youngsters and produced some glorious football on a mudbath of a pitch. Some of the players in the team have since go on to sign for high-level clubs and it was a joy to watch them that evening even though behind the scenes things were a mess. A close second is the 1-0 win over Dagenham in an FA Cup Fourth Qualifying Round replay at Brisbane Road. It felt like a poignant moment for O's to make sure they played in the first round of the FA Cup again. They have always competed in the first round of the FA Cup and for them not to do so in 2017 would have left a sour taste in everyone's mouth, but they produced a spirited display to beat their local rivals with a crucial goal-saving tackle in stoppage time. A classic FA Cup tie.





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
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LEAGUE ROUND-UP

Chris Ogden delves into The National League to preview what Salford fans can expect in their new division this season.

So the 2018/19 season is about to begin and a new season sees Salford joining a new league; the National League, the highest division of English non-league football and just one step away from the hallowed Football League.

As this is our first ever season at National League level, presenting us with tons of new teams that Salford have never played against before in our history, this column will look to follow how this year's National League campaign is progressing. With no fixtures to round up yet, let's have an initial look at the teams we are competing against in the National League this season:

CONTENDERS

Salford have entered a strong league littered with ex-Football League teams. Chesterfield and Barnet are both established Football League clubs who dropped down from League Two last season – having spent over 95 consecutive years in the EFL, Chesterfield will be serious contenders to bounce right back up.

Today's opponents Leyton Orient fell to earth with a bump last year, finishing a disappointing 13th after getting relegated from League Two the season before, but they boast a highly experienced squad, even boasting a player with Premier League know-how in ex-Reading player Jobi

Like us, AFC Fylde are relatively new to National League level but they've got last season's top scorer Danny Rowe and have the firepower to better their seventh place last time. Hartlepool may benefit from their new owner Raj Singh, while Aldershot have finished fifth two years in a row.

STALWARTS

What defines any league is not the promotion challengers, but teams who have been in the league for years. They know what it takes to stay in the league and compete every single season. One of the many new things

about the National League - from Salford's perspective - is competing nationally against teams from the South. and the league is full of those: Boreham Wood, Bromley, Dagenham and Redbridge, Ebbsfleet, Maidstone, Maidenhead, and, of course, Sutton United who played Arsenal in the FA Cup fifth round two seasons ago.

There will be many challenging days: Dover will be our furthest away trip, while Eastleigh in Hampshire will also be a slog. That isn't to discount the teams closer to home - Barrow, Gateshead, Halifax, Solihull Moors and Wrexham are all capable teams at this level who, on their day, can beat any opponent.

NEWCOMERS

Our most familiar opponents will be Harrogate Town who were in the National League North with Salford last year. Apart from our two wins against them to pip them to the title, Harrogate pushed us all the way and scored a whopping 100 goals, so we shouldn't be surprised if they make a strong start at National League level.

Havant and Waterlooville won the National League South with a late win against Concord Rangers on the final day and will carry that belief with them. Braintree Town won the play-offs despite finishing sixth in the league, beating Hampton and Richmond Borough on penalties. The Iron have experience at National level, having reached the play-offs a few seasons ago.


Just a few months ago many Ammies would have been content with consolidation after promotion but with the signings we have made, bookies are tipping Salford as favourites to win the league.

It's not a given - with only one automatic promotion spot. six play-off places and four relegation spots, clubs have to be ruthless to go up and most teams will have something to play for until the very end of the season. Ultimately, it is our first time in the National League and we will quickly see what our mettle is. Whatever happens in the National League this season, it will be fun finding out.

"IT'S MORE OR LESS ALL I KNOW, THE NATIONAL LEAGUE, SO I'M LOOKING FORWARD TO IT!"

Lois Maynard won promotion back to non-league's top flight in 2017-18 after signing for Salford City in the summer of 2017, and the influential central midfielder says that being back in The National League is a bit like being back at home.



APRIL seems a very long time ago now. Not least because it is actually over three months since the Vanarama National League North season ended, but also owing to the amount of football that has been played and the significant changes that have taken place.

The World Cup is always a tremendously exciting period, made even better by the unpredictable nature of events in Russia; Germany out in the group stages, Spain beaten by Russia on penalties, Brazil losing in the quarter-finals, and of course England reaching the semi-finals! Who can argue at that, or being able to watch three matches a day, or having football on nearly every day for four weeks? Not Lois Maynard for one...

"I love watching it! I watch as many games as I can just in football in general, I can watch 90 minutes of games, I can just sit there and watch games back-to-back so the World Cup has been amazing."

Cousin to England and United star Marcus Rashford, the midfielder enjoyed the performance of Gareth Southgate's side and the way they have created an identity.

"Obviously England did quite well so I was quite proud, they did well and got as far as they probably could, in hindsight, but they did very well and they had an identity which they haven't had for a while which was good."

At the same time, Maynard has found himself a part of a side trying to create a new identity under Graham Alexander, who was appointed Salford City manager in May. Having worked under Anthony Johnson and Bernard Morley last season, it is a change for Maynard as one of the players to stay on from last season's title-winning side, and the 29-year-old is positive about the new gaffer and what he brings.

"It's been really good, extremely hard in a physical sense

but it's been quite exciting tactically because it's new ideas, new formations from last year, so it's been exciting to learn from the new gaffer, and learn those new ideas.

"He's been brilliant, he's come in and he's got a way of how to play; everyone's had to buy into that way. He's got new ideas, and the training has been unbelievable.

"There's been hard, physical running, very hard, but then it's going to benefit us in the long run. He's a very good gaffer and all the players have taken to him."

PRE-SEASON

Often a challenging period for a footballer anyway, the unusually hot climate and the changes have made pre-season even more significant this season, but Salford have come out in good shape with three wins from five, and an encouraging performance in the 1-0 defeat to

League One Barnsley.

Games against both league and non-league sides have provided different challenges and levels of opposition for The Ammies, and combined with the training schedule Maynard feels that Alexander's preparations have gone well ahead of his and the club's first season in non-league's top flight.

"Pre-season's gone as well as it could have really.

"I think pre-season is there for one thing and that is to prepare for the first game of the season, which is this weekend, and it's gone well.

"Most people have stayed injury free, got some good minutes behind us, played against some good teams, and tried implementing some things from the training ground and implementing them into games, so it has been good.

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"There have been some games that have been footballing games, and in those games you can work on your footballing things, what you want to do and what you want to implement into matches.

"Then there's the other games like your Altrinchams which have been a bit more physical, and that's what you're going to get in The National League; there's footballing teams and there are physical teams so it's been a good balance in pre-season and hopefully we're all prepared."

THE NATIONAL LEAGUE

Starting his career locally, Maynard has spent the entirety of his playing days in non-league and more specifically in the top flight as a formidable opponent when playing for FC Halifax Town and Tranmere Rovers.

He was signed up by The Shavmen, who are our next visitors to The Peninsula Stadium on Tuesday 14th August. ahead of their return to The Conference in 2013 having won both the Supporters' and Players' Player of the Year at Winsford United in the North West Counties Football League in 2012-13. The gulf in leagues didn't faze Maynard one bit as he played an integral part in Halifax's remarkable run to the play-off semi-finals, where they lost to eventual winners Cambridge United.

In 2014-15, 12 goals in 39 appearances caught the eye of giants Tranmere Rovers who guickly snapped up the midfielder after Halifax had let Maynard's contract run down. The Prenton Park outfit missed out on the playoffs by two points, but qualified in 2016-17 and made it to the final where they lost 3-1 to Forest Green Rovers at Wemblev.

As Maynard made the move to The Peninsula Stadium in 2017, he brought with him one of the biggest wealths of experience in The National League and the 29-year-old says he is excited about playing in the division again.

"Very much so, it's more or less all I know The National League so I'm looking forward to it and albeit with a different team. I'm excited the same way.

The National League. There's always going to be teams in this league who will try and spend money, try and get out

of it. It's one of the hardest leagues to get out of probably, but we back ourselves to do the same thing, it's no different whoever you are.

"Obviously you've got your ex-league clubs, teams who are always going for it. You've got your Wrexhams, Leyton Orient, Dagenham & Redbridge, Aldershot, Barnet and Chesterfield now, Fylde were up there last year... All those teams will be going for it as they do every year so we've

"There's a few players who have played in this league so is there responsibility? Yeah, I guess so and if there's any input that we can give on certain players and stuff like that, certain games, certain grounds, then I'm sure we

One of the key elements, and certainly a focus of some national interest this summer, has been the recruitment. Big name signings like Danny Whitehead, who won The National League with Macclsefield Town last season. Danny Lloyd, from League One, and Adam Rooney from SPFL side Aberdeen, have led some fans of other clubs to accuse The Ammies and the owners of trying to buy our way into the Football League, but all that aside Maynard says that the quality of such players gives the whole club environment a positive lift. In addition to that, they are players who are hungry and want success, with promotion the target that is in mind.

"The recruitment has been unbelievable, we've signed players who, most have come from the league or have a bright future, so it shows you what the club's going for.

"As a player it makes you want to raise your game and you want the respect of the new signings, and they want the respect of people already at the club so it raises the place

"It would be unbelievable if we can get promoted, and it would be better than any other time I've come close because this is a team that's on my doorstep, so it would mean a lot more. I've got to the play-offs twice before so hopefully it's third time lucky!

"People have not come here to participate though, these "I've been in the play-offs twice with two different teams in are good players that have come here and we all want to challenge, and we all want to make a stamp and create

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ON THIS DAY

The Vanarama National League starts earlier than other leagues tend to start, so Chris Ogden takes a look back at some standout opening day fixtures...

In our recent history Salford tend to start the season well we've only lost one of our opening games since 2011.

> 5 August 2017 National League North Salford City 0 - 2 Darlington 1883

Last season we played against Darlington with optimism entering our second season in the Vanarama National League North. Three promotion contests in a row had made Darlington our modern day rivals and they successfully avenged a 5-1 defeat the season before, inflicting our first opening day defeat since 2011 when Warrington Town won 5-1 at Moor Lane with Jack Redshaw scoring the consolation.

Darlington took the lead through David Ferguson after David Syers hit the post with a ferocious rising drive, and didn't look losing it from there. Despite Salford pressure, a well drilled Darlington defended well and Ferguson made it two in the 95th minute as Salford pushed for an equaliser. Thankfully, that pattern didn't continue for the season - Darlington ended up in 12th place while we, of



6 August 2016 National League North Salford City 1-1 Gloucester City

Salford City's start to life at the National League North was eventful in a 1-1 draw against Gloucester City. It didn't look like it would be after an uneventful start to the first half, but the game sprung to life in the second half in the 50th minute as Steve O'Halloran hit a ball down the line for Richie Allen, who crossed for James Poole to calmly drag it in to the far corner for a deserved lead.

Gloucester's goalkeeper Jasbir Singh made several excellent saves to keep the score down, especially one tipping a left-footed shot from Poole onto the bar, and his efforts paid off - in the 65th minute, substitute Joe Parker wriggled through the Salford defence and made it 1-1. Jordan Hulme nearly snatched a winner late on, but it was not to be as Singh was the hero again, diving to his left to claw a header from Michael Nottingham off the goal line.

It proved to be a tricky season as the Ammies finished fourth but were eliminated in the play-off semi-final by FC Halifax Town on penalties.

15 August 2015 Northern Premier League Salford City 0-0 Marine FC

There were no goals in our first home game in the EvoStik Northern Premier League as Marine claimed a point and even nearly sneaked all three. Strike partners Jordan Hulme and Gareth Seddon had several chances. most notably Hulme with a cheeky back-heel, but Marine stood firm and had the best chance of the match late on, as Jamie Menagh struck a fierce shot from outside the box that cannoned back off the crossbar. Marine may have kept Salford at bay that day, but others didn't as we scored 94 goals, finished third and were promoted via the play-



14 August 2014 Northern Premier League Division One North Salford City 4 - 1 Scarborough

Salford won comfortably against Scarborough United in our first home league match under the Class of 92's ownership. A cross from Andrew Smart found Sam Madeley in the area, and he opened the scoring only for the visitors to equalise on the stroke of half time.

Scarborough started the second half by winning a penalty but were denied by Salford's 18-year-old goalie Tom Stewart. 



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
